It was felt that in such an event prompt action would be expected on the part of the health officers, and that the board ought to consider the subject, so as not to be caught wholly

unprepared.

Mr. O'Leary, seconded by Mr. Duck, proposed that the old town hall be used as a small-pox hospital, in the event of a building being required for that purpose.

An amendment was moved by Mr.

Walker, seconded by Mr. Petrie, negativing the foregoing. There being a tie, the chairman gave the casting vote against the proposal to use the town hall, which was accordingly lost.

HON. MR. JOLY'S RESIGNATION. QUEBEC, Nov. 29.—The Hon, H. G. Joly, formerly Premier of Quebec, has resigned his seat in the Legislature, his resignation being now in the hands of Mr. Speaker Wurtele. This action on the part of the hon. gentleman has been brought about by the Riel agitation now being carried on in the province, to which he is opposed. He has sent the following letter to his electors in Lothiniere :-"I received vesterday a copy of the

I see by the resolutions that a meeting is called for the 26th inst., immediately after the chanting of a mass for the repose of the soul of Louis Riel, and that a committee soul of Louis Riel, and that a committee has been appointed to prepare and submit resolutions for the approval of the assembly. I refuse to assist at the mass, not from any religious prejudice; as a proot of this I attended the funeral services of Hon. Judge Caron, Hon. Mr. Letellier, the late Lieutenant-Governor, and other public men of the Caron, the sussion.
