Those who have been favored by faiting Bobsaygeon will doubtless visiting Bobeaygeon will doubtless have seen, among many other objects of interest, the magnificent farm property of Mr. Chas. Fairbairn, reeve of Verulam township. It is situated on the Dunsford or Lindsay road, about one mile from the village of Bobeaygeon, or nearly half a mile from Little Bob river, on which are the extensive lumber mills of Mossom Boyd & Co. With Mr. Fairbairn's poantiful pri-With Mr. Fairbairn's beautiful pri-

rate residence and grounds we have now attract us. Westward from the house, on a farm of 954 acres, 300 of stables and sheds of the estate. The massive barn looms boldly up, 180 feet square, well boarded and all ready for the paint soon to cover its hrech-floore, with bays in plenty. Underneath are stone walled stables for cattle, sheep and horses, and the roothouses. The ceiling of these stables is nine feet high under the KE sills. At present Mr. Fairbairn has seventy-five head of cattle, nineteen sorses, besides numbers of sheep and wine, all in those stables. Passing in a trough before each animal is a FURS and SKINS constant stream of water. Thus the mimals can slake the thirst at any time. The water is pumped into large tanks aloft in the barn, and the flow is regulated by stop cocks. Thus there is extra precaution against fire on that account; for hose could readily be attached to the tanks, and the weight of water would alone throw a stream to its own level anywhere on

Of cattle Mr. Fairbairn's herd contains chiefly thoroughbred Durhams, Herefords, Polled Angue; besides grades. Of horses there are some noble specimens of full blooded Abbotteford Clydes; some "bloods"; but the majority are general purpose. The sheep are almost entirely of the Leicester breed, so famous both for long wool and for mutton. The hogs are good Berkshires. Though Mr. Fairbairn has an immense stock of

poultry, yet few are thoroughbred. The visitor cannot fail to be struck with the modern-nay more than modern style of the premises. Every living thing seems comfortable. The manure is regularly drawn off in sleighs and piled for future use, so Mangels, carrots and Swede turnips in order constitute the chief root sup-

The nay and straw is fed in racks in the stables. In very fine weather the animals are turned loose in an exercise yard where racks, containing straw are also placed. In feeding all the caretaker is required to do is to fork the straw from the "straw barn" through openings before the stock.

In glancing around the premises one instinctively asks himself, "Is there anything wanting to make this magnificent property more perfect? We could not see it.

How few of us consider the educating power, the civilizing influence on a community of a farm and buildings such as Mr. Fairbairn possesses! Its influence can scarcely be computed. We hope that his example will be followed by others of Verulam's wealthy farmers.
