IRISH HOME RULE.

The Orangemen of Ireland have had a mass meeting to protest against Home Rule on Parnell's basis.

What Orangemen and other Protestants fear is that the former spirit of oppression, displayed in past times where Roman Catholics have been or are a majority will again revive in Ireland.

There is no doubt but the people of Ireland, as well as of England and Scotland are in a miserable condition and partly through their own laws.

At the Ottawa correspondent of the Mail's dispatch announcing Prof. Foster's appointment to be Minister of Marine and Fisheries we wish to say a word.

Mr. Laurier said he would have been a rebel and have shouldered his musket against our volunteers had he lived on the Saskatchewan. Is he not all that now—minus the musket and the living on the Saskatchewan?

Barke once wrote, "Twenty gun-hoppers will make more noise in a meadow than one thousand oxen." Let us parody Burke: Twenty Rouge demagogues make more racket over the Riel question than one thousand loyal citizens.

We will venture there is one that Aquinas' summary of the circumstances would just have drawn a bead on the Hon. Wilfred Laurier as a rebel at Batoche, or have rammed a bayonet through him, as readily as he did on or through the misguided rebels on the Saskatchewan. But no—Laurier would doubtless have run away.

We publish, this issue, the letters of J. J. Curran, M. P. for Montreal, and Rev. Mr. Young who attended poor Scott in his last moments. Both will repay perusal, especially by those who sought to array the Irish with the French rebels against the Constitution. Such Irishmen as Mr. Curran are an honor to their country.

The Hon. Mr. Laurier is going to Toronto in January to convince the Young Liberals that the volunteers who fought against Riel were wrong. We suggest that he dress himself up as he would have been "had he lived on the Saskatchewan and been a rebel" as he said he would have been. We'll bet he would have made tracks.

We are informed by a "good Reformer" that the weekly Globe does not contain the articles from the daily but has usually a "leader" not found in the daily edition. If such is the case why is it? How few of us consider the educating power, the civilizing influence on a community of a farm and buildings such as Mr. Fairbairn possesses! Its influence can scarcely be computed.
