BETHANY. Special to the Warder. Two outbreaks of small-pox reported from Pontypool last week is causing a good deal of anxiety throughout the township and the health authorities are taking every precaution to prevent the disease from spreading. The affected district being entirely quarantined and all new arrivals immediately to the hospital at Pontypool. The hospital is under the charge of doctor George Hutton, M.D., assisted by trained nurses and everything possible is being done for the relief of those afflicted by this most terrible disease. Progress was made up in some of our churches on Sabbath which we trust will be speedily mirrored that the plague may be stayed and since the Almighty usually works by means we would have the duty of appealing to the people generally to make use of the money which has been placed at their disposal and which has been so judiciously provided by a very great protection from this disease. There have been 10 cases reported to date.
