

Mr. O'Leary's eld Durham friends be would have received many reminders that his former Darlington and Clarke pupils, now mature men, had not forgotten their old instructor.

Mr. O'Leary was born in 1802, near

Bandon, Cork Co., Ireland, and hence, though, we understand, he never even saw the celebrated Blarney stone, much less kissed it, nor walked in the groves of that noted place, yet his native village was not many miles, away. Therefore it was not many miles away. Therefore it is very probable that the then young and handsome Irishman was inspired with some of the magic influence of that beautiful locality. It is said, too, that if one kisses another who has kissed the stone the charm is genuine. So it is more than probable our good old friend has in that way, if in no other, ebtained the charming power. At all events Mr. O'Leary showed himself one of the most able, clear headed, strong bodied and kind hearted lads in Cork county; and while a very young man began teaching while a very young man began teaching school. About the year 1830, his parents emigrating to Canada led by chance to their being accompanied by their son, the subject of this sketch. For several years after his arrival, Mr. O'Leary settled at the village of Newcastle, in Durham county, where he successively was private that the public school as well as the public school as well as principal of the public school, as well as owner of a farm in Clarke township. Afterwards the school immediately east of Afterwards the school immediately east of Bowmanville, known as Shaw's, or Simpson's, was presided over by the able Irishman; and still later he was principal of Bowmanville school. At a later period Mr. O'Leary again taught in Simpson's school. While in Durham Mr. O'Leary

made many life-long triends, all the older inhabitants of that rich district bearing most kindly remembrances of former days. The late Hon. John Simpson, too, was always a staunch friend and supporter.

Previous to the Mackenzie rebellion Mr. O'Leary, an earnest and honest Reformer, well posted on constitutional history and government, had by voice and pen done his best to bring about constitutional changes, and to have responsible government introduced into the then Upper Canada. Indeed he was one of the finest orators and strongest debaters on the side of responsible government. So one Friday evening, soon after the outbreak of rebellion, on nearing his home—his family lived on the farm in Clarke township some miles from in Clarke township some miles from Newcastle, where Mr. O'Leary taught— Newcastle, where Mr. O'Leary taught—
he was very much surprised to find his
yard filled with armed and excited men.
On nearer approach he was greeted with
cheers, and suddenly found himself
elected commander-in-chief of the army.
They were a body of enthusiastic The Canadian Order of Foresters formed in procession headed by the Citizens' Band and marched to the ice rink which presented a brilliant appearance on Thursday evening last; being the occasion of the first carnival of the season. He concluded by refusing point blank to have anything to devith them as rebels; and they having seen their error, and convinced by his eloquent argument, disbanded. Some of the ringlesders were arrested, but those who laid information did not appear on the day of trial, so the prisoners were quietly dismissed and allowed to leave the district. Mr. O'Leary's course was most favorably considered at the time, and placed him high in public esteem.

Other very interesting stories are still current of Mr. O'Leary's teaching days in Durham. Like all the old stock of Irish schoolmasters, Mr. O'Leary's teaching days in problem than eat a dinner at any time. We remember one which impressed us, to the effects that a Headmaster of Bowman-ville grammar school had been asked by late Cal Reid of Bowmanville to solve a problem. The teacher tried and tried again but failed in a solution. At last by chance the question was laid before the public school teacher, Mr. O'Leary. He at once solved it. Some time later the facts were laid before the grammar school master who never recovered from the chagrin caused by his lack of knowledge. Many residents at the front in Clarke and Darlington remember well how to their then surrow but present joy, their kindhearted, though firm-handed teacher, did not spare the rod, feering to speil the child.
