TRUE CAUSES OF THE REBEL-

The Richts press are now endeavoring to couple "Indian grievances" with the causes of rebellion. Friends, a patient public will stand almost any amount of humbugging from a circus to a patent hay fork, but we think it will require very careful agency work to convince them that the "Indian question" had any connection whatever with the outbreak. The only indiene connected with the first outbreak were a pack of scoundrels who sought refuge on Canadian soil after murdering thousands in the great "Minnesota Massacre" over twenty years ago in Minnesota. The halfbreeds interested in rebellion were almost entirely a pack of scoundrels who were pardoned for rebelling in 1869 and 70; their leader was the murderer of Thomas Scott; their allies were the litelite press of Canada. It will not now do for the Rielite press and party to attempt to connect the Indiane with the cause. These poor creatures undoubtedly suffer hardships every winter just as unthrifty people do everywhere; they may even have occasional grievances against bad agents, traders, etc., but they were not concerned in the preliminaries of rebellion, nor were they active till some time after hostilities had commenced.
