**AMERON LAKE.**

We have had pleasant weather this  
week and good sleighing. The farm-  
ers have been very actively engaged,  
some drawing saw-logs to the mills  
and getting them sawn for future use,  
and others drawing cordwood; while  
one and all are getting ready to do  
their spring work.

**GRAND.** A meeting of "Lovely  
Grange," No. 192, was held in the  
Orange Hall, Friday, March 12th,  
when the subject of salt as a fertilizer  
was discussed. It was considered to  
be a great benefit to the land; it also  
acted as a destroyer of a good many  
pests such as the entom and all  
others that injure the growing crops,  
sown at the rate of from 200 to 300  
pounds to the acre. It also was very  
beneficial to root crops. One of the  
members present said that he was at  
Bro. H. Glendinning's farm, near  
Manilla, and in conversation with  
him on using salt he said, "I have  
used salt for several years, and intend  
to continue its use, as I consider it to  
be a great benefit to the land, and is  
the growing crop of almost any kind."  
He considered it caused his grain to  
get ripe a week sooner than his neigh-  
bors who did a true salt and that he  
had a very fair crop of wheat last  
year. As Bro. Glendinning's farm  
lies to the north it would have a ten-  
dency to be late to ripen grain. I have  
a barn lying in this shape and it is a  
week behind my neighbor's to ripen,  
and nothing but the lie of the land  
does it. I intend to use salt on it.  
I hear that some of the barrels of salt  
sold do not weigh over 225 lbs barrel  
and all; in fact, I saw the weight of  
three barrels which a farmer had  
bought. They would average about  
210 lbs. of salt, and none of the best  
at that.

**TOWNSHIP AFFAIRS.**—A question is  
asked by some of the ratepayers of  
this township where the different  
county grants have been expended in  
the township of Fenelon for the last  
seven or eight years, as we never get  
an account of the expenditure of these  
grants at the time of nomination.  
We are waiting for an explanation, as  
not one out of every twenty of the  
ratepayers ever see a county council  
report, and the reports of the town-  
ship are not out yet. "Keep them  
dark as long as you can" seems to be  
the aim, for if the people knew you  
as well as we do they would soon  
make a change in this township. On-  
tario county never makes any grant  
to separate members of the county  
council, or any special grants, and  
only assumes those bridges which the  
law provides it shall do. Now, sir,  
we consider that system of granting  
money to the different mem-  
bers of the county council is an in-  
justice to the ratepayers, and that this  
money is too often made a stepping  
stone to hold the members in office

year after year. If I am informed  
that some never has been laid out at  
all, and some has been laid out at a  
time of the year so that it has been  
useless. Now, sir, I consider that  
grant of money to the ratepayers to  
will be a gross imposition on the  
people, and should be abolished at  
once; and if a little more was needed  
let it be collected and used by the  
township council as a whole; and this  
would also stop the unfairness of  
special grants.
