We are sure the Victoria public are very much pleased with their revising officers for having the manhood to publicly alter their decision to require personal attendance on April 6th, into accepting a declaration after due notice instead.

THE VOTERS' LISTS AGAIN.

The Post with its usual equivocal endeavors to mislead the public by referring to Mr. Hudepeth's letter to misstate his points. The truth is that the letter sustains every one of ours.
