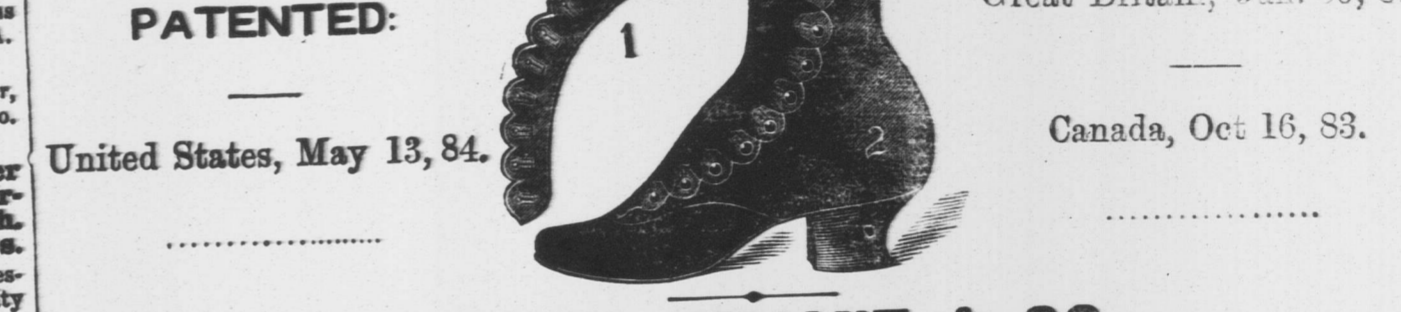

"Valiant's Patent Button Fly" being made of ONE MATERIAL only, stitching is dispensed with, so that there is no possibility of frayed edges and loose threads to give the shoe an unpleasing appearance.

The button-fly is made same thickness at the edge as the ordinary worked holes, and graduated to where it joins the upper, thus rendering it sufficiently pliable, whilst at the same time avoiding the possibility of any thing clumsy in the appearance of the inserted fly. It does away with those ugly wrinkles which with wear occur across the instep on all other shoes made to button.
