On Monday last, 7th of June, the imosing and impressive ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new St. Andrew's church in Lindsay took place. The day was showery and very windy, but shortly before three o'clock, the hour appointed, the ceremony began. Mr. Hastie continued to be minister until his resignation, which was accepted by the Presbytery of Lindsay on the 25th day of

The present pastorate began on the seventeenth day of June, 1884, by the ordination and induction of Reverend Daniel McTavish, M.A., then recently a student of Queen's University, Kingston. The necessity for a larger place of worship in a more central locality has existed ever since the union, and indeed the question of erecting a new church was liscussed by the two congregations before they were formally united, but since the beginning of the present pastorate the need has become more and more pressing. The very generous offer made by Mr. William Needler in December last to present to the congregation a lot on which to erect a church which he has since carried out at large cost to himself and with satisfaction to the congregation in all respects, and his liberal subscrip-tion towards a building fund led to a canvass of the members and adherents. So encouraging was the response and the unanimity displayed so complete, it was decided at a meeting of the congregation, held on the 30th day of December, 1885, to proceed with the work, and to-day, by the blessing of Almighty God, there is laid in His name the memorial stone of a building in which we trust the glorious Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ will eyer be proclaimed and the Triune God worshipped in sincerity and
