A new section has been formed in the township of Somerville to the west of the village of Kinmount; a school house is in course of erection and will probably be opened after the summer vacation. The site is very suitable, being on the Monek Road, about midway between Kinmount and the school in the Argue settlement. To form this new section several changes were made in the boundaries of sections in Somerville. No changes have been made in other townships.

SCHOOL HOUSES. The number of school houses is 50, including 5 in the town of Lindsay, 2 in Bobcaygeon, 1 in Omemee and 42 in rural districts. Of these 29 are of brick, 18 frame, and 3 log. The school houses erected within the last few years are much more substantial and better adapted for school purposes than most of those built some years ago.

The new frame school house erecte lat Omemee last year, for high and public school purposes, in place of one destroyed by fire, is a comfortable and well-arranged building. ARBOR DAY.

The number of trees reported as plant-The number of trees reported as planted on arbor day of last year was 313, as follows: Ops 153, Emily 43, Verulam 77, Somerville 40. In a few sections, particularly in No. 4 Ops, trees had been planted and flower beds laid out previous to last year, but in most of the sections, with the exception of the fence required by the regulations, the surroundings were as slovenly and unattractive as the most and the previous could desire. There are undity person could desire. There are still eight school sites not properly fenced. In some of the sections where no trees were planted last year, attempts were made to clean, level and otherwise improve the school premises, without which tree planting would be of little In sections where the dwelling houses

are of the most primitive character, and no attempts are made to improve the no attempts are made to improve the surroundings, trustees can hardly be expected to bestow much care on the school premises. But I see no reason why the school grounds should not be as well laid out as those of the average home. It would be well if they could be better. One great drawback is the frequent change of teachers. A teacher who is more likely to leave than to remain another year is not as likely to plant trees and make flower-beds as one who ex ...cts

The school is generally what the teacher makes it, and unless he has taste to appreciate the beautiful, industry to over-come difficulties, and tact to enlist the assistance of pupils and parents, but lit-tle will be accomplished.

The number of public school teachers The number of public school teachers in East Victoria is 60, of which there are in Lindsay 13, Bobcaygeon 3, Omemee 2, Ops 11, Emily 12, Verulam 11, and in Somerville 8. Of these, last year, 25 were male and 37 were female. Two held first class provincial certificates, 17 second class, 1 old county board, 29 third class, and 6 interim certificates.

The number of schools that changed teachers at the beginning of this year was 24. In Ops 4 schools changed teachers, in Emily 7, in Verulam 7, in Somerville 4, in Bobcaygeon 1. The only change in Lindsay was the accepting a substitute in the case of a teacher who wished to attend the Normal school.
