LINDSAY'S PROGRESS.—A. Wright Kay, wholesale boot and shoe dealer of Lindsay, last week shipped to British Columbia twelve cases, containing six hundred pairs of boots and shoes. This is very creditable to Lindsay enterprises.

COURTSHIP.—On Saturday night last about 11 o'clock, while chief constable Bell was on his way home, he was struck a severe blow on the forehead with a stone weighing two and a half pounds. THE LATE CHARLES ORMOND.—At two o'clock this morning Charles Ormond, who had been a resident of Peterboro for about forty years, died at his residence on Murray street. The immediate cause of his death was the result of an accident which occurred on Thursday, June 10th. He was in his chair in the garden, when, as he dozed into a little nap, the chair gave way and he fell to the ground, fracturing the thigh bone of his right leg. Being ripe in years and infirm, he was unable to weather the weakness brought on. He sank lower and lower day by day till he passed away. The deceased was born in Warrington, Berkshire, on August 4th, in the year 1802. He attended a private school in that place, and, after passing a collegiate course, took up the study of drugs in his native town. In the year 1843 he came to this country. After prospecting for some time the vicinity of Peterborough he became one of the pioneer teachers, taking charge of a school at Bloomfield, in the township of Cavan, and from him Mr. Wm. Walsh, afterwards his partner in business, received his primary education. While engaged in this pursuit he became acquainted with Miss Sarah Howden, daughter of the late Robt. Howden, sr., and before leaving his charge they were married. In 1865 the deceased settled down. He entered into partnership with Mr. J. W. Gilmore and carried on a drug business in the stand now occupied by Messrs. Taylor & Macdonald. In 1868 he entered into partnership with Mr. Wm. Walsh, and carried on business in the present stand till death dissolved the contract between them. The deceased, popularly known as Dr. Ormond, served in the municipal council for a number of years, representing the people of No. 2 Ward. He was in the council at the time of the visit of the Prince of Wales here, and was on the platform, on the 7th of the month, when Judge Boucher read the address of welcome. He was in religion a member of the Church of England St. Luke's and in politics a life-long reformer. His wife, and one daughter, Mrs. Bradburn, Lindsay, survive him.—[Peterboro Review]

This in addition to making the air wet, prolongs the decaying process and renders the air less pure for breathing purposes."

Your imagination need take no lofty flight to picture the condition of such a door yard, especially in showery weather.
