DEATH OF A DISTINGUISHED CANADIAN.—On Saturday last Prof. Payne P.H. D. lecturer in Chemistry and Natural Sciences in the Royal Military College, Kingston, died at Pictou, Nova Scotia, after a lingering illness. The deceased gentleman was formerly known throughout Canada, especially from his connection with the Royal Military College, a connection he obtained from the distinguished name he had made for himself in his department of knowledge. The death of this promising Canadian fills with special severity on this locality, inasmuch as he was brother to an accomplished citizen, the wife of Rev. Dr. McTavish. Though his death has for some time been expected, still sad news always falls heavily, no matter what the preparation may be. Therefore, do we tender our sympathy and condolence to the friends of the deceased in their bereavement; for though our acquaintance with the late Professor Payne was brief, it being a military one yet we formed the same opinion of him as did all—he was a perfect gentleman.

DIPHTHERIA.—The Woodville Advocate, a little sheet printed in Peterborough, to injure this town by stating the reason the schools here did not re-open promptly on September 1st was, not because the rooms were not ready, but because diphtheria was prevalent in town. We are in a position to give such yarns official denial. There have been very few deaths in Lindsay from diphtheria this summer. Only three in the town are known to have succumbed during the month; a lower death rate than even Woodville district can show. There have been cases of throat, but all now throat in times of excitement are said to be diphtheria. Lying rumors of every kind have been afloat about every village in the county; but sensible people read the papers. Only last Monday a gentleman talked us about seeing quite a certain person's death in town, he said the cause was diphtheria. On inquiry we found the individual referred to had died two miles nearer the village in question than to Lindsay, and the cause of death was not diphtheria. Indeed there is every reason to think there is less disease in Lindsay than in any other municipality in this district. Moreover, what has been here was not in fact that attended public schools.

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.—The Evening Times, Hamilton, of Thursday April 30, 1886, says:—"The tone and finish of the principal part in the play of last night, but perhaps the name most familiar is that of Miss Ada Gray, who claims to be the best exponent of the heroine. The same fault, too existed with Richard Hare. Mr. Clarke gave a very natural and carefully acted interpretation of the character of Archibald Canby, and the part of Etcher could not fall to a better actress than Miss Mary Bankson. Mr. Twerner as Francis Levison was only fair. There was a little too much humor infused into the character to be consistent with the character of his nature. The ladies calloused to have very expensive wardrobes and those worn yesterday afternoon and evening were exceedingly admired.
