work as if confined to the high school alone.

While there are some who say: "Under Mr. O'Connor the school has succeeded beyond all precedent. The first university scholarships and honors for the school have been won under him. The first First Class certificates have also been won. A greater percentage of students have passed examinations than under any former master."

We know from having taught them that under the regime of Mr. O'Connor's predecessor here, Lindsay and Victoria students in large numbers attended in Toronto. To our own knowledge there were upwards of forty, some of whom were from Lindsay, and one of whom is now on Lindsay's staff of teachers—who left here in Mr. Tilley's time for Toronto. Others left this town for St. Catharines and Collingwood. If there were grievances, why were not they aired if there are faults in any of the staff now let those persons—and those only—be dealt with. To get at one or two, or three, the whole four are notified.

But the reason no specific investigation was held is, according to the members of the Board, "because the whole thing would be then public." A curious reason indeed. Is it not public now? Will boards in other towns, to whom the present teachers here may apply, ask the minutiae of details of their leaving here? Certainly not. They will know Mr. O'Connell got the three months' notice in Lindsay; and he is therefore forwardly damned. Further, several shrewd lawyers, members of that board, have been guilty of acting in a manner commendatory of the teachers without giving them British justice. This scarcely the course they pursue towards a thief in the police office. Even he has a chance to defend himself. Mr. Milner, for instance, is tried, found guilty and condemned without even knowing that he is in a trial. And so far as the public are officially learn, there is no evidence against one of the staff, other than the gossip of the "old ladies" of both sexes aforesaid.

THE OPINION OF THE LONDON TIMES.

The London Times of the 30th ult. has an able article outlining the work accomplished by the Irish Royal and Patriotic Union in the recent British elections. In literature alone the union circulated in Great Britain, over a million circulars, 439,000 pamphlets, 143,200 posters. In England and Wales alone, the union maintained during the contests no less than 43 eminent members of their society as speakers and lecturers. In Scotland operations were conducted by a separate staff. In England and Wales they worked in 98 constituencies, winning from the enemy 38, increasing Unionist majorities in 38, and decreasing Gladstonian majorities in the remainder. The Times considers the Royal and Patriotic Union has a noble work ahead, and should be liberally supported with funds. The Irish Delegates, Rev. Dr. Kane and Mr. Smith, are from the noble army of patriotic speakers.
