That a Free Churchman must fill all the places, and be foremost in everything, to the exclusion of everyone else.

He unfortunately belongs to a class whom Justice describes as hating everybody else, as cordially as they love themselves, who resort to cunning, pretence and deception for that they cannot acquire by more honorable means. We should expect nothing from such a man and should trust him with as little as we would expect from Mr. Mot for what he cannot help.
