The lecture room was literally packed while the parlor which presented a homelike and inviting appearance, and reading room contained a large number who entertained themselves in examining the panels, pictures, mottoes &c. and in pleasant conversation. The collection amounted to about \$20 being more than half the sum required to wipe out the existing debt.

INTERESTING.—We notice by the Glasgow Herald of Sept. 20th that Mr. R. D. Dundas, Springville, Ont., has been making some purchases in Ojibwa. Three yearling colts were purchased from Mr. Park Hatten, Bishopston. These, together with the West Teviotdale Premium horse for this district "Game Law" (2700) purchased from Mr. McCubbin, Drum Beavering, were shipped by the Dominion Line Consignments on Saturday morning. The four formed a very nice, tidy selection. One of the yearling colts is an animal of great promise. He was bred by Mr. Arthur of Carlton Place's Glavia, and was out of the same mare as the noted horse "General Bell" (1748). The second colt was purchased from Mr. Sterling show and was got by "His Royal Highness" (2160) a son of "Dunlop," while his dam is a very useful mare, owned by Mr. Corrick and got by "Kantia Robin" (608) the horse which beat the "Prince of Wales" (673). The third colt was bred by the Kilmichael Farmhouse horse "Bodie Who Has" (4008) a horse which left a lot of promising colts and fillies.

SCOTT'S AER GAZON.—On Nov. 11th Geo. Carr, accused of an infraction of the Canada Temperance Act by Inspector Short, was brought before Police Magistrate A. O'Leary. Defendant pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs. On Nov. 15th Andrew Leary was up before the Police Magistrate, charged with a violation of the law. The case was proven. The defendant asked for time to bring witnesses to rebut the evidence. An adjournment was granted till next Monday morning, and the case was postponed for one week. On Nov. 16th Geo. Carr, charged with second offence, appeared before the Police Magistrate. Counsel for defendant asked for adjournment. Prosecution objected on the ground that some witnesses were present and should be examined, and got adjourned into court the second time, which was allowed. The first witness swore that he had not, to the best of his knowledge, been in defendant's house between dates, if he was he was so much under the influence of King Alcohol that he could not remember it. The second witness swore that he got nothing but pop and cigars which were not intoxicating.
