CANNINGTON.

The liberal conservative convention which was held here on Thursday the 25th inst., was the largest attended and the most unanimous in its conclusions ever held in the riding of North Ontario. Any fears that may have been entertained as to the introduction of side issues was happily dispelled, every delegate conceding something of his own opinion in order to secure united action. From early in the morning up to noon delegates from every district in the riding poured into the village and when at 12.30 p.m. the president Mr. Gillespie M.D. was called to the chair and declared the convention opened. Not less than two hundred representatives were then seated in the hall, and during the progress of the meeting constant additions were being made. Nominations for the Commons and Legislature being called for a number of gentlemen present were nominated as candidates, but all retired but two viz., Messrs F. Madill of Beaverton for the Commons, and J. McGilivray of Uxbridge for the Legislature, whose nominations were unanimously ratified. The candidates then addressed the meeting for a short time, and were each heartily cheered on returning to their seats. Great satisfaction is expressed on all sides at the result of the convention, and every one is determined to work faithfully for the election of the gentlemen chosen.

Active preparations are being made by the conservatives of Cannington and

Sunderland for the reception of the delegates and colleagues at the latter place on Wednesday Dec. 1st. The delegates are to be erected, and a procession will be formed, which we gather will be a large one.
