Beale, moving here in 1842, he may be said to be a native of Mariposa, there was no village of Little Britain in those days. Brought up to the trade of a clothier, in 1860 he purchased property in the 19th concession on which he erected the Beale factory, which he operated until 1871, when he retired from that business and commenced to work for the legal profession. Being called to the bar in due course he entered partnership with his brother-in-law, J. McIntyre of Lindsay, but after a few years retired, he was appointed St. John's Magistrate of Haliburton, which he resigned after some time for a ship in the Queen's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice, which office he held at the time of his death. During his residence at the Beale mills he filled the office of first deputy clerk of Mariposa two years. In politics he was a strong Liberal but respected the opinions of those who differed from him. In a word he was an honest, upright gentleman, a Christian, one whose profession he carried out, an affectionate husband and kind parent. Mr. Whitehead of Miss Macfarlane G. Prior about the time he commenced to study for the legal profession, by whom he leaves one daughter and one son.
