OBITUARY.—It is our sad duty to relate

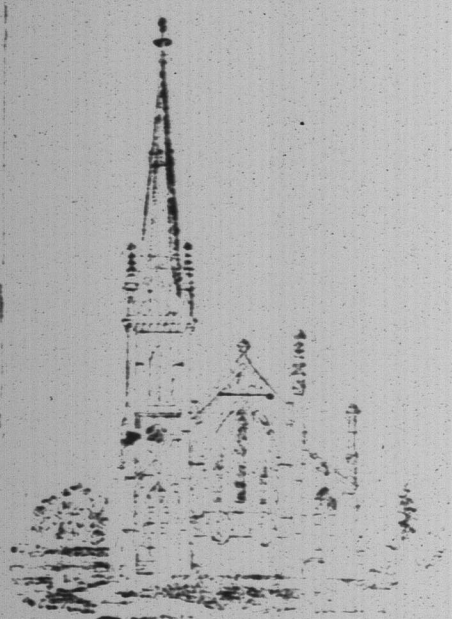
