It was known as the "Acta Diarna" or proceedings of the day, and it not only occupied the position but also served some of the purposes of a modern newspaper. It was in fact the Daily News of old Rome and was published both under the Republic and the Empire. Senece informs us that it contained abstracts of the proceedings in courie of law and public assemblies, accounts of public works or buildings in progress, recitals of punishments inflicted upon offenders, a list of births, marriages and deaths, reports of trials for divorce, which in that day were too frequent, accounts of foots and carthquakes, price current, etc., all supplied, as are the newspapers of the present day, by reporters who were termed actuaris. It would have been interesting if Senece had also informed us the amount charged for each copy of this written newspaper, but probably the circulation was confined to posting up copies in a few of the most public places in the city.

Some system of shorthand was in use among the Romans and was used to report the burning and cloquent speeches of their creators. Circero employed atenographers, as we may now term them, to report the speech of Cato, in the celebrated debate of the Roman Senate upon the Cataline conspiracy, Julius Casar is said to be the first ruler

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
