## Burglars at Woodville.

WOODVILLE, Ont., Aug. 24th.—There was a considerable sensation in our usually quiet village early this morning, when it was discovered that the branch store of Hugh Wilson, of Cunningham, was broken into and the door of the safe blown to pieces. D. McLachlan, his manager, says there was only about a dollar of change left in the safe. The burglars also visited the G.T.R., and here they were more fortunate, for they got \$75 in cash, which was the private money of Mr. Adams, the agent, which he had left in the ticket box. ## Ontario Rifle Association Matches.

The above matches were held this week on the ranges, Toronto. Eight from Lindsay and ten from Bowmanville, all members of the 45th battalion attended. Altogether there were nearly 300 present. The 45th have succeeded in taking the "bum" over the whole province, the united teams from Bowmanville and Lindsay standing first. In individual prizes Staff Sergt. Williamson won two; S. Sylvester, two; J. Goodall, two; Capt. and Adj. S. Hughes, two. Messrs. Goodall and Hughes were members of the battalion team, also, which won first prize for the province, a cup presented by Sir Peter Fair, \$250, and cash, \$50. They also stand a chance in the extra series. Some of the Bowmanville men made extraordinary shooting. The following made up the team:—

No. 1 Co., of Bowmanville, carried off first prize, 379 points, for a company team, winning over all others by 31 points. No. 4 Co., Lindsay, came nearly being in fourth prize.

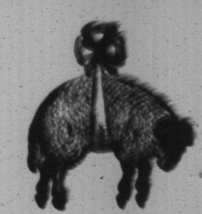
