In the absence of grappling irons and such appliances, help had to be found in the individual efforts of two or three divers, with the above result after three hours' work.

ISLAY.

Special to The Warder. CROPS.—The bulk of this year's crop is now under shelter, the doing of which involved more activity and management than had for some years been experienced. Here, as in other places, the prolonged drought ripened the grain all of a sudden, some just when it had reached maturity, but the greater portion of it before that time and has no doubt been the source of the universal lament, "poor crop."

Those who used the small crop were at a loss to keep pace with the grain as fast as it ripened. Even those who had self-binders found the time precious enough. There are some fields of late oats yet uncut, which, if they escape frost will be a fair crop. Those who spent time and labor on their rot crop, have a very promising result for their work. Of course they are now at a stand owing to the continuance of dry weather, but after a few good drinks will go on their way rejoicing. Summing up all, there will doubtless be a deficiency in the quantity of grain which the crop in the earlier part of the season promised, but there is a good opening by which the farmer can overcome this loss if taken advantage of in the proper time. There are now two months and a half to give the land plenty of ploughing, or in other words a thorough sowing, and this extra cultivating will enable the crop of 1888, to give a surplus that will in all probability counterbalance the deficiency in this year's crop. We don't mean to say that two crops will grow in one year, but figuring this at a two-third crop, we humbly petition next year for one and a third.

OBITUARY.—It becomes our sad duty to chronicle the death of Mrs. Donald Brown. She died on the 20th inst., in the 79th year of her age, her remains were interred in the Glenora burying ground. The cause in which she was held was clearly manifested by the large concourse of friends who attended her funeral.
