DEAD OF DYPHTHERIA.

In the Death of Mr. David Skiving, London Lane & Front Street, Lindsay.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Mr. David Skiving, of the Bank of British North America, died of diphtheria this morning, and owing to the nature of the disease the funeral took place this afternoon. The deceased was one of the most popular residents of London. His banking experience extended over twenty years, he having been first sent out from Glasgow to Halifax by the Bank of Montreal in 1866. Subsequently he was transferred to Hamilton, and again in 1871 or 72 to London, where he spent the greater part of his life.

One sad phase of Mr. Skiving's death is the fact that he had just returned to this, his home town, from a visit to his wife, who had been laid up for six months' holidays to revivify his failing land, which he intended to start for shortly.

SHARP GETS A STAY.

A Big Figure for a Big Ship.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The naval board appointed to estimate the cost of building the 6000 ton armored battleship, designed by the Iron Ship Building Company of England, completed its labors to-day. The last estimate for constructing the hull and fittings are \$1,800,000, and for engines and machinery \$800,000, making a total of \$2,600,000, which is \$124,000 less than the sum appropriated by Congress for the purpose.

BY NO MEANS DEPENDENT.

THE OWNERS of the Scotch Yacht "Thistle" are, Sept. 28.—Mr. Watson, designer of the yacht "Thistle," said to-day he had died at two o'clock for a dry dock, but both were unable to accommodate the "Thistle," a general belief in yachting circles is that the "Thistle's" bottom is all right.

Sept. 29.—Disley of the Brooklyn Dry Dock said to-day "There is nothing the matter with the bottom of the 'Thistle.' The paint on her is the best known, it is quick drying and not at all likely to blister in the water at present temperatures."

Mr. Bell, the principal owner of the "Thistle," said this morning they were by no means dependent. The Volunteer was Slightly Hampered.

Yachtsmen talked all day long about the race. It agreed that the Volunteer had proved herself a better boat than the "Thistle," although it was generally admitted that the victory of the "Thistle" was not really so decisive as it appeared from glancing at the figure of the race. The yachtsmen recognized that the Scotch boat had beaten the Volunteer's time on the run home and had held the slip going out.

On being 5 to the Sandy Hook Lightship. It is a little longer than the race was run by the Volunteer, and the time she gained there was as much due to superior handling as to the length of the boat. Fully allowing for the mistakes of Capt. Barr, and two of the other yachtsmen, it is probable they did not lose anything that they were not entitled to.
