STILLWELL'S STILL CELL

OFFAWA, Nov. 2-Mr. Donald Macmaster, OFFAWA, Nov. 2.—Mr. Donaid Macmuster, Q.C., and Mr. Jas. Leitch of Cornwall to-day presented a petition to Chief Justice Sir William Ritchie in chambers for a writ of haboas corpus quashing the sentence passed on Mr. Stillwell, the editor of The Glongarrian, sentenced a few days ago by Judge O'Connor to one month's imprisonment and a fine of \$200, with two months' additional imisonment if the fine was not pard, for al-ged libel of Mr. Patrick Purcell, M.P.

The ground of the application was that the order exceeded his jurisdiction in the terms of the sentence and that the commit-ment framed upon the sentence was a nullity. The application was made in virtue of the habeas corpus-jurisdiction conferred upon the judges of the Supreme Court to review the proceedings in oriminal matters in the lower courts. The one points in support of the petition were that Judge O'Connor had no right to order that the defendant's goods should be levied on to satisfy the fine of \$200 imposed and that he had no right to impose imprisonment as an al-ternative for non-payment of the fine, the ibel statute simply empowering the judge to mpose a fine or imprisonment, or both, but not giving him power to authorize distress or mprisonment for non-payment of the fine as was provided under the Summary Convic-

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
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
