JOHN MARTIN'S FIRE HORN.—This fire escape is constructed of a wire cord capable of bearing over 600 lbs. strain. It is wound on a spool fastened in a small frame. There are two brackets projecting on the ends of the spool which regulate the speed. It is perfectly safe. A rope fastened to the frame passes round the body under the arms. The wire is attached to the window frame by a iron pin, and the weight of the body spins out the wire. It is so simple that any one can be put in every bedroom of a building, and in large public buildings also. It weighs about 5 lbs., and can be put in a small cabinet.
