It is reported that the C.P.R. will have trains running between Toronto and the Niagara River before this year is out. Mr. Justice Richmond was engaged yesterday in the Mayor's court, and presided in the case of Township of Notewanaga v. the Hamilton and Northwestern Railway. The Northern Railway was served a party defendant. Judgment was rendered in favor of the township. The Chancery Divisional Court sittings will begin to-day.
