That Price Essay. To the Editor of The Warbler. In your issue of the 20th ult., I noticed an essay by Theo. Beall. The object of the essay was, as named in the outset, doubtless to show the condition of the Canadian farm in its true light...

But to the essay, I may say that matters pertaining to agriculture have an interest for your correspondent, whose desire it is that truth and right may prevail in the interest of farmers generally.

The point I would especially call attention to in Mr. Beall's essay is the result arrived at from his average or representative farm of 100 acres (nearly). "This farm, of 110 acres, cleared and ready for implements, is valued at \$4,547, and yields products to the value of \$288.70 annually, almost 18 per cent. on the investment; and that, "supposing the farm implements and stock were mortgaged, the owner receives sufficient proceeds from the 20 acres of cleared land to pay the interest on the whole amount and have a balance of \$270 on hand."

That such a result should be arrived at, and a prize awarded therefor, is something surprising, and is worthy of an explanation. I am one of those who believe "the laborer is worthy of his hire," but as to the kind of hire appear in Mr. Beall's calculation, he must allow the reader to conclude that the farmers of Canada have some special art of extracting from their farms large returns without any expenditure whatever for labor. If he has discovered how "18 per cent." per annum can be made at legitimate farming without any outlay for the usual toil that farm operations involve, then indeed a premium should await the discoverer.
