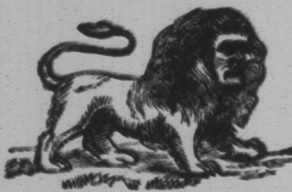

THE LATE NELSON HEALIP.—Rarely does it fall to the fate of a locality to mourn the death of a citizen so generally well respected and beloved as was Nelson Healip of Victoria Road, reeve of the township of Bexley. Mr. Healip in youth was successful public school teacher, a graduate of Toronto Normal school. Later he settled on the large farm with which his full manhood has been associated. It is situated adjoining the estate of the late Geo. Laidlaw, on the shores of Balsam lake. Mr. Healip has for many a year been honored by the citizens of Bexley as Reeve of the township, and by the county councillors as several times Warden of Victoria. He was also closely identified with North Victoria Agricultural Society as president, and in 1887 was president of the Liberal Conservative Association for North Victoria and was regarded with favor by the mass of the electorate as a proper candidate for a seat in the House of Commons.

The touching letter from the pen of Mr. J. H. Harvey of Cobocook in another column illustrates the close affection existing between Mr. Healip and his neighbors. Several from Lindsay purposed attending the funeral, and as they were determined to drive. However, on setting out on Tuesday morning we found the roads frozen and so rough as to be almost impassable. To reach Victoria Road short of eight or ten hours was impossible, so at least one of his Lindsay brothers was reluctantly obliged to return. However, Nelson Healip will not be forgotten among his Lindsay brethren and friends. The flags on the town hall, and THE WARDER office flew at half-mast in honor of the deceased. To the mourning widow and family the most heartily sympathy is extended in this the trying hour of life.
