ROMANISM VS. CITIZENSHIP.—The romish church is a rotten tree, rotting at its base, and spreading its poisonous branches over the earth. It is a source of that which, which was fast showing itself in the liberation of their intellects from superstition and dogmatism, has had "missionaries" here for some time bringing or seeking to bring the faithful into line. But their labor has been in vain.

The roman catholics of this district are gradually doing their own thinking more and more every day, and such moments as the recent "Vigil" which, undoubtedly excited the zeal of many sincere believers, also still further served to bring the eyes of the independent thinkers of this district.

Not having heard of any sign of the performance presented, we speak only from secondary evidence. Anathemas was pronounced against all who should have acted protestant church men, or avowed protestants, or educate their children in protestant or public schools where there were separate schools. As there were also many surprising arguments used to immortalize the "Vigil" story, and other constituents of a first class paganism.

With the religious side of the question we shall not now deal, though why journalists should regularly attack the protestant belief, or the methodist and episcopalian and stand with hatred and anger on lip before arrogant, insolent and intolerant romanism, passes our comprehension. We simply inform the "missionaries" abroad that the day has gone by when such cock-and-bull stories were among roman catholics, much less among protestants. The people now-days in this locality, at all events are trying to do their own thinking, and no amount of clerical rages and sentences, followed up by any quantity of superstitious or idolatrous preaching or teaching can alter the current of their thoughts.

Roman catholics are bound to be free men, even if they must come from a churchmen. The light of liberty-of-conscience, of man's right to independence of spirit and thought, is shining the whole population; and Christ's acts and life rather than imaginary doctrines drawn from or distorted from his acts and life, are now the basis of thought in religion among freemen. With slaves anything from a wooden log, to a painted, varnished and talow-candled image of the Virgin Mary may serve to keep the ignorant of clerical rages and sentences, followed up by any quantity of superstitious or idolatrous preaching or teaching to read it, and priestcraft and slavery will vanish.
