An Ancient Musical Organ. At Kioto a young Japanese introduced himself, saying that he had understood I was an admirer of Japanese lacquer, and desired to show me a fine piece of it of ancie workmanship. It proved to be a fine specimen of the "sho." some 600 years old. Its history, authenticated by documents, shows that it was made by Bodaisan Teishun in the twelfth century, for a prince of Kaga. The artist made two of them, the other or becoming the property of the imperial family. The instrument shown me came finally into the hands of a Buddhist priest belonging to the temple of Chi-On-In in Kioto, who, now retired, seeks to dispose of it.

The Japanese claim the sho to have be invented in Japan many centuries ago. A Ho-o bird, a mythical creature, a sort of huge bird of paradise, one day flew down from heaven into the imperial palace and sung sweetly; a genius, hearing this, sought to imitate it by making a musical instrument which would produce, when played upon, the song of the He-o bird. The gods heard his prayers and hence the origin of the sho.

The facts are that this instrument is Chinese origin, dating back on record to 700 years before Christ, in China it is called "cheng" and is the first known of all free reed instruments. From it, through Russia, came the church organ about three centuries ago, and since that the various form of the accordion, concertina, flageolet, melo-deon and all other forms of musical instruments which employ a vibrating reed, fixed at one end, made of wood or metal. The melodeon, an invention of Carhart, in Buffalo, New York, in 1843, has enabled the musicloving homes of America and Europe to en-music of the organ. It was in com-pact, portable form and sold at little cost, and was the origin of the many forms of
