the cemetery. The sympathy of the public is

NEVER MIND MR. GRUNDY.—"The Rev. W.  
Williams of Lindsay, Ont., is the representa-  
tive of methodism who had been invited to  
occupy the pulpit of Chalmers' Presbyterian  
church yesterday morning, and the sturdy  
presbyterians of the north-east will not soon  
forget his eloquent sermon. Dr. Williams is  
well advanced in years, with snowy white hair,  
but the earnestness of his bearing, the ringing  
of his voice, and the brilliancy of his  
eye, are apt to make his hearers forget that he  
is no longer a young man. He speaks en-  
tirely without notes, and, when struck by the  
depth of his belief, the intensity of his  
subject, he launches forth into a passionate  
appeal against conventionalism, with its  
antagonism to the teachings of Jesus Christ.  
One is forcibly reminded of the most popular  
methodist minister of the mother country, the  
Rev. Hugh Price Hughes. He chose for his  
text the 12th verse of the 12th chapter of  
Matthew's Gospel: 'How much then is a man  
better than a sheep?' 'Wherefore it is lawful  
to do good on the Sabbath day.' In the  
course of an excellent discourse of which we  
can only give a few extracts here Dr.  
Williams said,—"The Pharisees were com-  
ing by asking questions of our Lord,—not that  
they sought for information, but that they  
might find fault with his utterance. How  
did Jesus answer them? His answers were  
works, not words—noble and God-like actions,  
rather than learned confusions of faith. The  
spirit of formalism is not dead; it takes a great  
deal of killing; it is alive, very much alive,  
to-day. People are more afraid of what their  
neighbors will say than of what God will say.  
Jesus says, 'It is lawful to do good on the  
Sabbath,' therefore obey his teaching.' It is  
not for us to do so, you have to outrage public  
opinion, outrage us; but do not take what  
Mr. Grundy says in preference to what God  
says. The Saviour meant that doing good  
was the rule of Christian life." "When  
man obeys the commands of Christ in these  
matters, he touches God, he sits side by side  
with his great High priest." Has he some-  
times in common with the animal mentioned  
that is in a man better than the 'sheephead'?

That is in a man? But is it not a fact that  
it is in the 'sheephead' that we find the most  
of these things; but what is the object  
that is ever before us on the other side, or in  
some cases here? Is it not 'what shall we eat  
and what shall we drink, and wherewithal  
shall we be clothed?' But what did the Son  
of Man? 'Seek ye first the Kingdom of God  
and His righteousness, and all these things  
shall be added unto you.' At the conclusion  
of the sermon Dr. Williams offered up a  
 fervent prayer that the work that he had  
been given to deliver to his hearers, whom he  
might never meet again in this world, might  
take deep root in their hearts.—Montreal  
Witness.
