Benefits of Extending the Rail

Mr. Same Hughes, Editor of The Warder, Mr. Sum. Hughes, Railor of The Warder.

DEAR SIR,—When the township of Laxton gave a bonoue to the Nipissing railway which is now a part of the Grand Trunk, to Coboconk, the ratepayers were made to believe that said railway would be extended to Trading Lake; and that we would get a station in the township of Laxton. I think it is a great mintake that it is not extended, both for the benefit of the railway company and for the


