But hot interests, it is obvious, are directly at variance with those of the great body of the people who desire cheap food and other articles of prime necessity and Canada has no right to pay for the privilege of supplying such articles to the people of the United States. Our experience with the United States in the matter of treaties has not been of such a favorable character as to make us particularly desiring to enter into any new arrangements with them, for we have generally found they managed to retain all the advantage on their state.

In our view the greatest difficulty in dealing with the United States is the want of permanence in any trade arrangement adopted. The abrogation of a treaty after trade has been turned into new channels by it, and the conditions of commerce have been adjusted to it, offsates confision and loss. It is better to have no treaty of commerce than adopt one which, as soon as the people have been accumulationed to it, is liable to be abrogated. If we are to have a new treaty it should not be placed within the power of either party to discounting it in ten or twelve years.—St. John N. H. Sun.
