#### The Imperial Fiscal Unity Move ment.

London, March 7 .- The victory of Sir John Macdonald in the Canadian elections has given a decided impetus to the Imperial fiscal unity movement, and its advocates are using every means in their power to bring the question prominently before the public. Mr. Howard Vincent, M. P. for Sheffield, who may be looked upon as the premoter of fiscal unity in England, as secretary of the new United Empire Trade League, will on Friday March 27, move in the House of Commons for the appointment of a royal commission to enquire whether the empire can be brough into closer commercial union without materially raising the price of food and raw materials in the United Kingdom, and without depriving each country represented of the powers to regulate its own tariff. The motion has the support of the London branch of the Imperial Federation League, and it is thought that it will be well received in the H use of Com. mons. It is hoped that the Government will grant the commission.
