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Sir Charles at Amherst.

FAREWELL SPEECH TO THE NOVA SCOTIA. AMHERST, N.S., March 9.—Sir Charles Tupper delivered his farewell address here today before returning to Ottawa.

Yet, oh! 'twere better she should be extinct, Her timely, princely progress but a dream; Some subtle, unobtrusive, in romance, And pained upon us for historic truth!

Sublimely great her power to be free, And give the world an answer to the lie That she's bewitched by platonic gold. Oh, Canada be loyal to thyself!

Be loyal to thy flag! Ushari it now! A universe is watching for thy sign; It asks a sign that Canada is free, A sign that treason she forever spurns; A sign that traitors are but dastards here.

High in the breeze let sturdy arms be raised, And make her crown the prodigy of years; While Britons looking on admire the scene, Applaud the loyalty that strengthens hearts, And cry exultant, "Canada is free!"

Present, the Mayor, Rev. Fisher, deputy-reverend Bryans and Kyles, councillors Crandell, Armstrong, Winters, Connolly and Cahill.

From H. E. Crosby, Uxbridge, asking the co-operation of the council in regard to getting an earlier train to Toronto.—Fried.

From A. D. Stewart, secretary of the Ontario fish and game preservation society, asking for the use of the council chamber for the meeting of the society, which society had arranged to meet in Lindsay.—Granted.

From Julius Minkler re cost of dog tags.—Fried.

From J. C. Stoeckert, tax collector, submitting the names of parties whose taxes he recommended to be remitted. Request complied with save that part referring to James Hart and John Pearce, which was referred back to the collector.

From Robert Wilson, charging the sanitary inspector and fire warden with voting in the South Ward and afterwards attempting to vote in the East Ward.

From Thos. Menzies and others, asking for an electric light to be placed on the corner of St. Patrick and Bertie streets, in the east ward. Referred to fire and water committee.

Report of the joint committee of the Board of Trade and council read, and on motion, filed.

Report of finance committee read, recommending the payment of several accounts which were given in detail; also recommending that the following hotel keepers receive reduced licenses, the chief of police having recommended the same, viz., Edward Bevan, John Mauder, W. Simpson and Thos. McConnell.—Report adopted.

Street and bridge committee reported, that they had opened tenders for cedar, and recommended that all tenders of 3 cents per foot be accepted, and that they be authorized to purchase 8000 feet, at that price, and that for heaving that all tenders at 35 cents per 100 feet be accepted; the tenders for the McKinley thimble were, as the great object lesson. The Government had relied too much upon the intelligence of the country, without taking measures to educate and thoroughly inform the farmers upon the great question at issue.

Mr. W. B. Fee addressed the council in reference to water courses in the east ward, which were closed up with ice, and asking the council to remedy the evil complained of by clearing the culvert of ice, otherwise serious injury would be done his property.

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A Word for Canada's Teachers. LINDEN VALLEY, March 14, 1891.

Extract from a letter written by Inspector H. Bevan to E. L. Kellog, M.A., Publisher, New York.

DEAR SIR.— \* \* \* In speaking of our teachers as "poor," "ignorant," "unappreciative of their work," "dead teachers," etc., because they do not read your publications, you greatly underestimate them.

If you think so just send over a dozen of your state public school teachers next July to try our examinations. Your first try to our second class examinations and your second try to our third class examinations will be a surprise to you.

Our young district teachers (a class below 3rd), passed for 2nd class without preparation last July in the States.

Neither are our teachers unappreciative of their work. All must have professional training in our Model or Normal schools after they have attended high school and passed their entrance examination in a professional examination they must be acquainted with the best authors upon the science teaching. Then we actually have educational publications of our own of no mean standard, which our teachers nearly all take.

When they have read these and worked two or three hours per day out of school at school work as they are expected to do, they have not much time left for foreign educational literature.

You will excuse me for saying that you are mistaken as to Canadians. You do not travel enough, or you would know that we have a great country up here north of you, larger than yours—and in it the best public school system, (perhaps) in the world. We have three times the amount of unsettled fertile land that you have. Your population has increased since independence twenty fold, ours thirty five fold. Since 1812, yours has increased eight fold, ours twenty fold.

There, I have written as requested and good naturally. I will send you sets of our last examination papers if you will publish them. You may have any and perhaps give the others some new ideas.
