The only exception is Hungary, where there are better prospects, but it is almost certain the world's wheat consumption will exceed the production computed. Whatever the magnitude of America's erop may be it will not be sufficient to over the European desiet, thus compelling an extensive draft upon the reserves, for the third year in succession. The Standard in conclusion says—"The increased home consumption, the decreased wheat area owing to the spread of population and recourse to scientific tillage in order to repair the waste of first settlers, thus increasing the cost of production, must inevitably remove the American farmers' formidable competition in European markets and allow the English farmer to look forward to a prosperous future.

Immigration Prospects

A very significant movement is just now going on in Dakota. The despatches announce that carloads of emigrants are almost daily leaving for the Canadian North-West, and that the special agents of our Government and railways, who are over there promoting the exodus, are meeting with rough treatment at the hands of merchants and land agents. The movement must be assuming large quarters to undertake a lecturing tour through the state-the object of this extraordinary effort being to counteract as far as possible the propagandism of the Canadian agents. But he will scarcely succeed. The movement has its foundation in the fact that the conditions of life in Manitoba and the North-west are superior to those which surround the settler in south Dakota. The land is better, the climate is more congenial and taxation is much lower. These are almost irresistible attractions. It was necessary, however, to have these facts made known across the line before an immigration of any magnitude could be looked for; and it stands to the credit of Hon. John Carling's far-seeing judgment that steps were taken to disseminate informa-tion respecting Canada in the western states. His efforts were ridiculed by liberals in Parliament; but the events that are now transpiring fully vindicate him. From across the Atlantic there also

comes very encouraging news. It is announced that the immigration of the present season will be large and of a superior class. For the most part those who are coming out are tenant farmers with their families, who will bring with them the means of making a promising start in our western prairies. It may be directly influenced by the reports of the British tenant farmers' delegates who visited Canada last year on the invitation of the Minister of Agriculture; but it is probable that the majority have been induced to leave this spring by the small bonus offered to settlers in the North-west. The full effect of the delegates' reports will not be realized until 1892, For this year the inducement of a cash bonus to those who take up land in Manitoba or the territories, amounting to a considerable part of the passage money, will be effective in drawing a large num-ber of the most desirable class of set-

It requires no great perspicuity to see that we are on the eve of an unprecedentimmigration movement. It seeems in-evitable that tens of thousands will flock across the line from the western states during the next few years to take advantage of the better conditions of life to be found on this side. The facilities for bringing them are vastly superior to what they were ten years ago. From Europe there must also come a great mass of settlers within the current decade. The signs are unmistakable. If the statistics of immigration to this continent are examined, it will be seen that the movement of incoming population has always exhibited the phenomenon of a series of waves. The tide has risen to a maximum point and then ebbed to a minimum, a period of ten years usually being covered observe that we are just now at the lowest point which has been reached for six or eight years, and following the analogy of all experience a crescendo movement must begin this year. Where else, it may be fairly asked, can this gathering tide of immigration flow but to the shores of Canada? The United States has alienated its public domain almost wholly, and has no more free lands of any agricultural value to offer settlers; while the lands in the hands of the railway corporations are either worthless or beyond the means of the emigrant. And it has always been free or cheap lands which has always been the attractive power to settlers from all parts of the world. From an agricultural standpoint the western states are full, and our neighbors. instead of encouraging immigration are taking unusual steps to discourage it. It

may, therefore, be said that Canada's This hopeful view is sustained by the fact that there never was a time when Canada was so much and so favorably talked about in the old world and in the United states as now. The well directed Department are bearing fruit, and in the most desirable form. The men who are preparing to leave for the Dominion are tenant farmers for the most part, or men who have had an agricultural training of some sort. These are the men who are most wanted here. The persistant warnings of the department against artisans and professional men coming out are being heeded, and there is no evidence of any other than a genuine agricultural movement.
