John J. Caldwell Abbott was born 70 years ago in the rectory of St. Andrew's parish, County of Argenteuil, Quebec. His father was the Rev. Joseph Abbott, M.A., who in 1818 came from England and settled at St. Andrew's as the first Anglican incumbent. The elder Abbott, after a brief ree parish of Chatham.
