REGINA VS LINDSAY.—The grand jury at the last Assizes found a true bill against the town of Lindsay for flooding and obstructing Wellington street. The matter was not tried but allowed to stand over and a notice was now served by Dr. DeGrassi, the private prosecutor on the corporation requiring them to plead at the sessions.
