OMEMEE.

EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS GONE UP IN SMOKE.—Thursday night the village of Omemee was devastated by the devastating element. The business part of the village was almost swept away; fourteen buildings, including stores, hotels, dwellings and barns were burned. The loss is estimated at \$80,000, on which there is a very little insurance. The calamity is a severe one for Omemee. This is the second, and probably the worst, fire which has occurred in the village within the past two years.

TWO HOTELS.—THE WINDSOR HOUSE AND BROWN'S HOTEL.

The fire broke out about 10.30 o'clock Thursday night in the stables of Brown's hotel, which were quickly destroyed. A high wind carried the flames into the hotel, and from thence the fire spread along both sides of the street. The fire engines were brought into requisition and hundreds of willing hands lent their aid in fighting the fierce flames, but without success. The fire continued unchecked until it burned itself out.

Two hotels.—The Windsor House and Brown's hotel.
Leroy & Sons, fine double store, containing \$12,000 stock of general merchandise, was totally destroyed; insured for \$9,000.
Currie & Co.'s dry goods store.
McHae's furniture store, dwelling and stables.
The Herald office and dwelling of Mr. Calder, the proprietor.
The barber's shop and dwelling.
Johnson's barber shop.
E. Milligan's drug store and dwelling.
Mimm's harness shop, loss \$1,500.
McNiely's hardware store badly damaged, and the residence and buildings saved with great difficulty.
The stocks and contents of the above premises were in every case either burned or rendered a total loss. Very little property was saved. Other buildings in the vicinity were badly scorched.
The buildings burned were of both brick and wood.
Amongst the places burned out was the G.N.W. Telegraph Co.'s office, in Milligan's drug store.
The fire supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.
No accidents are reported, but Miss Nina English had a narrow escape. She was coming down a ladder from the third story of the Windsor House, when the ladder began slipping and she jumped from the second story into the arms of several men who were watching below.
