A Patriotic Article.

Le Monitor de Commerce published an article last Thursday which, being almost exclusively circulated amongst the business men of French Canada, cannot but produce a most salutary effect upon the public mind. The article in question is entitled "Ontario," and begins by saying that certain people are led away by the belief that the sister province is inhabited by a population animated by a sort of fanaticism against the French Canadian of the province of Quebec. There are it is true, some people in the province of Ontario who do not lose an occasion in their conversation or in the course of their relations with people of our province to express openly their contempt for its people; but on the other hand, there are a class of cranks in the province of Quebec, and amongst all professions, who are the victims of political and religious prejudice, and in this particular they are quite on a par with the finest production of the sister province. "Practice and reign" is the device put in "practice every day" by far too many people in both provinces who are profiting by the ignorant ignorance of their people as to the customs and habits of each province, and deliberately keeping up an absurd antagonism between the two provinces and their people. It is against this shameful work of these cranks that the tried friends of the country, and especially the business men of the province, should league themselves together. In order to do this we must, in the first place, be better informed as to the true character of the people of Ontario, and not attribute to the entire population a sentiment of dislike and contempt which is only the privilege of a very small fraction. That on which our opinion of the province of Quebec rests, is that the farmers and business men frequent our markets in large numbers to buy our goods, and especially to sell us the products of their farms and manufactures. To-day a large part of Ontario's fortune is controlled by a cold, economical, laborious and far seeing race, who certainly do not allow race or religious sentiment to enter upon the business domain, contrary to what we do ourselves to too great an extent. In the province of Ontario there are several hundred thousand French Canadians who live in harmony with their English, Irish and Scotch neighbors, contributing their part to the inextinguishable progress of that province which owes its preponderating influence in the confederation to that spirit of union which reigns in their midst, and which is a worthy example for us in the province of Quebec. We have already observed that there are yet too many people in this province who are under the impression that the limits of Canada are confined to the frontiers of the province of Quebec, and the notion we destroy this impression, which prevents the two provinces being brought together in common sympathy the sooner will this feeling disappear not only in business but in the social domain.

New Dominion Line Steamer.

A new steamer, named the Labrador, from the building yard of Messrs. Harland and Wolff, Limited, Belfast, has just been added to the Dominion line for that company's service from Liverpool to Montreal. The trial trip on the run across the Channel was most successful, there being an entire absence of heating, the speed throughout being 15 knots, which was in excess of the expectations of the owners. The vessel is constructed throughout of steel of extra strength necessary for the North Atlantic trade. She has eight watertight bulkheads, and her dimensions are:—Length 400, breadth 47, and depth 32 feet; tonnage, 4,700 gross, and 2,998 net register; dead-weight capacity, 5,700 tons. She has a double bottom throughout containing water ballast, and also fresh water supply for cattle. Her rig is four pole mast, square-rigged on foremast only. The steering gear is Messrs. Wilson & Pirrie's patent, geared direct to the rudder head, dispensing altogether with chains. The engines are triple expansion, indicating 5,800 horse power, pressure 170 lbs. A special feature of the Labrador is that the saloon and staterooms for first class passengers are contained in a house erected on the bridge deck, being thus entirely isolated from other departments of the ship, and securing perfect ventilation in all weathers. It is only necessary to say that the saloon, smoking room, ladies' boudoir and staterooms are finished in Messrs. Harland & Wolff's well-known style. The second cabin is on the main deck underneath. The comfort of this class of passenger has been catered far beyond what is customary. The steering passenger decks are very lofty. Their beds of white canvas, in framework of wood, can be folded and put up under the beams, so as to be out of the way during the daytime. In the cattle decks every provision is made in accordance with the new regulations of the British Board of Agriculture and the Canadian Government for the safe carriage and comfort of the animals. Water is delivered from the fresh water tanks by pipes carried overhead the entire length of the ship and on both sides, with taps and short lengths of hose attached at frequent intervals, thus reducing the labor of the attendant to a minimum, and securing proper watering of the animals. The ventilation of the fresh water tanks is provided by cowls, by Uley's automatic ventilating ports, which can be kept open in all weathers, as they exclude water while admitting air, by two trunks extending fore and aft, fixed overhead, with apertures at frequent intervals, through which air, drawn from

the deck above, is forced by two large fans, each driven by a separate engine. Electric light is fitted throughout the vessel, with two complete sets of generating plant, supplied by Allen, of London. Protection against fire is provided by steam pipes connecting with each separate compartment, by which steam can be turned into any part for extinguishing fire, the valves for same being placed together on deck, where they are easily accessible. The refrigerating machinery is Heblam's cold-dry-air system, with chambers capable of conveying a large quantity of dressed beef. The Labrador will be classed on the Admiralty List as a transport, being admirably adapted for troops and cavalry. The ship is finished throughout in the style for which Messrs. Harland and Wolff's building-yard is so justly famed, and has been constructed under the supervision of Mr. William Glover, consulting engineer to the Company.—Liverpool Journal of Commerce, August 17th, 1891.

Liquor Brutality.

It is about time to ask the question, Does the granting of a liquor license mean permission to violate not only the license law, but also civil and criminal law? Why do we ask such a question? Because of the repeated outbreaks into open violence of the liquor party against informers, against witnesses who give evidence against them in courts of justice, and any who dare to oppose them.

Some two months ago an outrage of this nature occurred at Portage la Prairie the details of which are too long for publication, but in which two ministers of the gospel were the subjects of an attack which resulted in murder. We have not observed the first intimation of this brutal attack in any of our daily papers. If it had been a political fracas it would doubtless have been ventilated in the public press. In such cases as this, why should the aggrieved party be compelled, if they would obtain redress, to assume the expense and incur the odium of prosecuting the offenders? What with the law's delay, quibbles raised by the defence, and probably swindled by their own lawyer, the risk is too great for poor ministers of the gospel to run.

We call upon the Christian ministry to "stand up" for temperance. When they do so and suffer in consequence, must they suffer in silence? We think it is clearly the duty of the Government, on representation being made to it, to institute through their law officers criminal proceedings against the parties engaged in such assault, and if convicted entore the whole penalty of the law, so that others may be deterred from like practices.

We trust the coming convention of the Ontario Prohibitory Alliance will take this matter up and see that justice is done.

If any of the men holding licenses can be directly connected with this outrage their licenses should be immediately revoked and they disqualified from holding a license forever after.

WHICH WOMEN?—"A woman's place is her home." So says the publican. Does he say it to his barmaid? Does he say it to the poor wife out washing; earning money which her husband spends at his bar?

Does he say it to the poor, lost girl spending the price of her shame in another glass of his fiery liquid? No; he only says it to the women who, constrained by love for home, come forth to save and protect the home.

With the "suspension" of the Halifax Voice following so soon upon the winding up of the Nation, the Citizen is now the only weekly temperance paper in the Dominion.

Now that the thrifty housekeeper is agitated over the abundance of fruit and the cheapness of sugar the temptation to manufacture "home made wine" arises strongly within her. Wine that has been fermented certainly contains alcohol to a greater or less extent. If it is not well "aged" every appearance of evil! If wives and mothers would set themselves the question—Will this drink I am making ever teach any of my loved ones to become a drunkard? they might decide not to make any home-made wine.

If, in seeking election to the Local or Dominion Legislatures a candidate, either by himself or his agent, can be proven to have exercised undue influence with or over the electors, whether by treating or payment or compromise of payment for certain services, his election is declared void, and in certain instances he is disqualified from offering himself as a candidate again for some years. We say that as it should be, we say that down the bars against corruption. But, the candidate for Parliament and the candidate for a liquor license! He may have names on his petition of persons who have passed over to the "great majority" of persons who have left the country or district; or persons who have no legal right to have their names on such a petition. Is his petition rejected because of such practices? Oh, no! he is disqualified from receiving or holding a license because of such a willful wrongdoing! By no means. He may induce persons to sign his petition for considerations given or promised, and one may prove all these charges against him, with the probability that having put the poor man to some expense in defending himself (never mind to how much expense or trouble you have been put to) he has gained the sympathy of the Commissioner, who, as a salutation grant the prayer of his petition. Can such things be proven? They can! and we stand prepared with the proof. This is another of those things which "no fellow, you know, can understand."

Items of interest.

At Brussels a clock is shown that is wound up daily by the sun. As long as the sun shines frequently enough the clock will keep in perpetual motion. An interesting comparison was recently made of two of the greatest railroad corporations in the world, one English, the other American. The Pennsylvania system regarded as one aggregation (though it includes more than one hundred minor corporations) works 7,915 miles of railroad and canal, a share and bonded capital of \$700,000,000, gross earnings in 1890 of \$188,000,000 and the movement in the same year of 137,000,000 tons of freight, and 84,000,000 passengers. The English corporation referred to, the London and Northwestern has an authorized capital of \$588,877,979, and 1,916 miles of road, on which the gross receipts for one year were \$29,615,886.

Interesting experiments have been conducted at the observatory of the McGill University, the object of which has been to determine the exact longitude of Montreal and points on the Atlantic seaboard. Previous to making the connection with Greenwich in order to determine the exact time it took for a telegraphic signal to cross the Atlantic, the McGill observatory was connected on Sunday with the Commercial Cable Company's station at Canso, where an automatic contrivance was arranged so that the land line and the cable should work into each other. A duplex circuit being thus arranged between Montreal and Water-ville, Ireland, 129 signals were sent and the average time of transmission proved to be a second and one-fifth-hundredth.

Shooting a candle through a two-inch solid plank without disturbing it in the least is being outdone by dynamite, which is so quick in its action that a tender green leaf can be compressed into the hardest steel before it has time to flatten. One of the experiments of the United States Torpedo works was to place some leaves between two heavy, flat pieces of iron, set them on a firm foundation and see what gun cotton would do in forcing the iron pieces together. The reaction was so great from just being exploded in the open air, that one of the iron pieces was driven down upon the other quick enough to catch an exact and complete impression of the leaves before they could escape. It is also a singular fact that the gun-cotton itself should sink deep into the iron when it explodes, showing the points of the letters stamped into the cartridges. This novel method of engraving by gun-powder is one of this century.

The results of the cheese industry have this year been most satisfactory. The exports since the opening of navigation via Montreal has been somewhat less than in 1890, but the price received has been so much higher as to more than make up for the decreased export. In round numbers the shipments have been about 51,000,000 pounds in 1891 against 54,000,000 in 1890. The price has ruled from one-half to about one cent higher than in 1890. The market is being cleared in good condition, there being little accumulation of stock, with a prospect of a steady demand at fair rates for the rest of the season. The returns to the farmer of the cattle trade has also been good. The exports to date have been about 60,000 head, compared with 58,000 head in 1890, and though the dealers have no special reason for rejoicing the price paid to the producers have not been curtailed on that account.—Orillia Packet.
