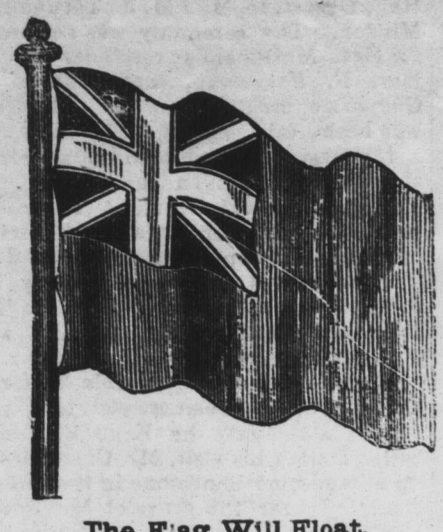

The Flag Will Float.

WHEN HER MAJESTY'S COURTS ARE IN SESSION IN ONTARIO.

SANDWICH, Nov. 11.—An incident of the Fall Assizes held here is attracting a great deal of attention, and no doubt will prove interesting to the general reader, especially if he is a true Canadian. Mr. Justice Falconbridge was the presiding judge at the assizes, which opened shortly after one of the notorious meetings of the Continental Ugly Club. The story may be told in narrative form:—
Mr. Justice Falconbridge (arriving at the court house grounds)—"Mr. Sheriff, I do not see that a flag has been hoisted on the court house."

The Sheriff—"Your lordship, our flag is in the west end of the court house, and it is hoisted."

Mr. Justice Falconbridge—"Old or new, it is proper that the British flag should float over a British court house while the court is in session."

The Sheriff—"It shall be done, your lordship."

Exact the sheriff, who gets hold of a very decent flag, which floats over the building for the balance of the day.

Next morning, on arrival at the court house grounds:—
Mr. Justice Falconbridge—"Mr. Sheriff, where is the flag?"

The Sheriff—"The hoists broke during the night, and we cannot hold the flag."

Mr. Justice Falconbridge—"You must hold it. Get the hoists mended before we adjourn for lunch."

Hours of adjournment arrives. When leaving the court house:—
Mr. Justice Falconbridge—"Mr. Sheriff, the flag is not flying. What is the reason?"

The Sheriff—"The county clerk says that it will cost \$10 to mend the hoists."

Mr. Justice Falconbridge—"It is most proper that the British flag should be hoisted on an occasion like the present. I purpose that it shall be. It will cost the county clerk a good deal less to pay that \$10 than it will to have me adjourn the court at the expense of the county. This court will not proceed until the flag is hoisted."

Before the lunch hour had expired the hoists had been mended and the flag was flying. It remained at the head of the flag-staff during the whole of the assizes. The firm which had mended the hoists were given a testimonial by his lordship for great satisfaction to the loyal people of Essex, and an overwhelming majority of the people of Essex are loyal.

Mr. Justice Falconbridge was heard to remark that heretofore whether he held assizes in Ontario he had held them in England, and that he had found court houses that were not decorated with the flag of the empire, by law, and he would insist that the law be complied with in this, as in every other respect.
