LITTLE CURRENT - MANITOULIN

ISLAND. To The Editor of the Warder.

DEAR SIR, -1 suppose you think that I have forgot to write to let you know Mr. McCrimmon in the chair. how we are progressing here. Not so, as I wanted to give a correct account, as well as having experience before making any statement about this place, as I know you, as well as I, do not wish anything but the truth. Now, sir, I have been here upwards of two years, and have seen quite a portion of the island, I am now many old settlers told me that they never knew such a dry summer before on the island, and they thought we were going to have a famine. It looked very like it. I travelled over the fields to look at the erops, when I observed some of the grain headed out and the balance of the seed

convinced that I have arrived at about the best part of it for farming or stock raising. We have this year extra heavy crops, considering the season, and you Will say so too when I tell you that the early part of the summer was very warm and dry, having scarcely any rain, and on the ground just sprouting, and some from two to six inches high. Down poured the rain and the growth started, and we had large crops although late, good quality; grain harvesting was completed by the end of October. Peas were a heavy crop. Potatoes extra. I had off one quarter acre 105 bushels, allowing four pails full for a bushel. I from the size of a marble to a hen egg. I had some that weighed two and one quarter pounds, and this on land that some told me nothing would grow on, begause it was so stoney. Those around Lindsay who have been here have seen the ground beside my dwelling. I am now convinced that if the soil here was half as well worked as it is down there, we would excel in crops, as the growth here is rapid. I would say to those of our young men wishing to make a cheap and good home had better be moving, as the property here is on the rise and will go up. It wants grit and hard work for awhile, and then comes comfort and a home. When I arrived here there was only one house and the frame of another We have now six dwelling houses, two stores, a thingle and saw mill, a blacksmith shop, and also a wharf, where the largest steamships can come up to. We have been visited this season with atesmships, schooners and tugs, besides numerous sail boats. A road has been made from here to the main road and made from here to the main road and another is in contemplation between here and Little Current. A brick-yard has been started here, and we expect by this time next year, if not before, to have plenty of brick. Dr. Herriman paid us two visits this season, and was astonished to see so much improvement in so short a time. He has spent a lot of money in making the wha-f, building mill, and elearing land, and the end is not yet; he purposes making greater improvements next year. I wish him success and good returns for his money, which there is not the slightest doubt but he will have. We want here a flour mill, carding mill and foundry, which I am sure would do well. Our wool has to be shipped from the island to be carded, and all implements have to be imported here. The winters liere are milder than down there; the summer is beautiful and refreshing.

Many are of opinion, because this place is called an island, that it is a small place, but they would soon find, after travelling about 100 miles, besides sailing agrees lakes, that it was a large place. We have lakes on the island that are from 100 to 200 feet above the north channel and Georgian Bay waters, and

the query is, where are they fed from, as heavy streams are always emptying out of them and receiving no supply from the land. There is every indication of coal oil, salt and su'phur near here. This has been a stormy season with high winds, heavy thunder storms and rain.

UNITED STATES SENATE REFUSE TO ACT. In 1854, after much correspondence, a treaty of reciprocity was at length negotiated. I need not mention the long list of articles it covered. The treaty is known to everybody. Scarcely had the treaty been put into operation when agitation began in the United States for its amendment or abrogation. This, in the face of the fact that manufactured goods were excluded by express words from the operation of the treaty, that the agitation was taken up by the Legislature of New York state and pressed upon Congress by the resolution of both Houses of that body. And this had its effect. In 1865 notice of the abrogation of the treaty was given by the United states, but neither Great Britain or Canada abandoned the friendly attitude they had always taken. When the notice of the abrogation of the treaty of 1854 was given on March 17, 1865, by Mr. O. F. Adams, in London to Lord John Russell, the British Minister was disposed to think that the Government of the United States was not serious, so great a body of commercial opinion in the United States seemed favorable to the continuance of the treaty. But the politicians were more active than the merchants, and Consul Wilkins, in a report of September 7, 1865, said that at the Detroit convention the New York delegates "had been well educated in the school of opposition." In 1865 Sir Alexander Galt and W. P. Howland from Canada, Hon. W. A. Henry from Nova Scotia and Hon. A. J. Smith from New Brunswick were sent by their representive Governments to Washington to co-operate with Sir F. Bruce in a friendly attempt at negotiation for a renewal of the treaty of 1854. These gentlemen found "that no renewal or extension of that existing treaty would be made by the Amercan authorities, but

that whatever was done must be done by legislation." THE NEGOTIATIONS FAILED owing to the unfriendly feeling in Congress, a result which Lord Clarendon, in a despatch to Sir F. Bruce most sincerely deplored. By the Customs Act of 1868, section 6, certain the Customs Act of 1868; section 6, certain enumerated articles, the growth of the United States "free of duty or at a less rate of duty than is provided in the said schedule, upon the proclamation of the government in council, whenever the United States shall provide for the importation of similar articles from Canada into that country free of duty, or at a less rate of duty than is now imposed on the importation from Canada of such articles into the United States." This was an clive branch held out by Canada to the United States in spite of the hostile experiences of previous years. In 1869, Sir John Rose was sent by the Canadian Government to Washington, and, in conjunction with Sir Edward Thornton, proposed new negotiations, with the consent and approval of the British Government of that time, for a reciprocity treaty based on the treaty of 1854, with the addition of manufactured articles to the free list, the mutual opening of the coasting trade, the protection of patents and copyrights, and a treaty of extradition. It was found impossible to make any propositions which the American Government would accept, and the negotiations fell through. In 1871, during the session of the joint committee which framed the Washington treaty, Sir John A. Explorand, commissioner for Canada, and his colleagues, the British enumerated articles, the growth of the United
