



Pork Raising. pork ready for the market at some period of the year other than during the October, November and December months. This fact is very clearly brought out in a bulletin issued by the Guelph Experiment Station in March of the present year. It is therein stated that at the commencement of the experiment, June 7th, 1890, prime animals brought \$5.25 per one hundred pounds, live weight, that at the close of the experiment weight, that at the close of the experiment of the present of the count.

Some experiments conducted by Sleighthoim Broe., Humber, Ont., during the past season sustain the view that good profits are to be realized from pork making when the work is realized from pork making when the work is judiciously done. These may be substantially stated as follows: They commenced with three litters of pigs farrowed March 28th, April 7th respectively. They were suckled for six weeks and atterwards fed in three pens, each of which contained eight pigs. These pens hed a floor of earth. The pigs were fed by measure—shorts, two parts; ground barley, two parts. of earth. The pigs were fed by measure—shorts, two parts; ground barley, two parts; and ground peas, one part. The food was mixed with well water at each meal until July 17th, when sufficient for three meals was mixed each morning. Two single handfuls of salt were added to the evening feed. The food was valued at 55 cents per bushel for barley, 75 cents for peas, and \$21 per ton for shorts. It took 4.8 pounds of the mixture to produce one pound of pork, and a cost of 5.07 cents. one pound of pork, and a cost of 5.07 cents per pound. It should also be mentioned that a small quantity of green peas were fed in straw when in season, and a little later green cern in the stalk. These are not reckned in the above estimate, but there value was not very much.

The pigs in one pen were killed August 12th
They averaged 85 lbs. The price received in
Toronto was \$6.80 per cwt. Those in the
two other lots were slaughtered August 31st.
They averaged 130 lbs. in weight, and sold
in Toronto for \$7.25 per cwt. One of these
animals dressed 150 lbs., which is a gain of
one nound per day. The profits were on an animals dressed 150 lbs., which is a gain of one pound per day. The profits were, on an average, \$2.33 on each animal. This would mean a handsome percentage. The dams of these animals were Yorkshire grades, and the sires purebred Yorkshire, thus confirming the opinion of Mr. Wm. Davies as to the high value of the Yorkshires when crossed upon some less rangy breed for purposes of pork making.

Several valuable lessons may be learned from this experiment:

1. It proves most conclusively that porkmaking is profitable when judiciously conducted. The prices charged for the food were high, considerably higher than the average in Ontario. They were probably prices paid in Toronto, and yet, notwiths and inc. the high prices allowed, the profits were substantial. The labor and manure are not taken into account, but the latter will considerably more than offset the former.

2. It proves the value of Yorkshire grades for feeding purposes. A gain of one pound per day for live weight is an excellent gain, but when one pound per day is gained of dead weight the gain is rather remarkable. It

Apple and Cheese Excorts.

KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 25 .- D. McAuley an extensive fruit grower of Picton; has returned from Liverpool. Mr. McAuley says the export of apples to England during the past season has resulted fairly profitably to the shippers. Canadian apples have real zed from three shillings to four shillings a barrel more than the American and are rapidly outting the latter in the market. Mr. McAuley is also engaged in the export of cheese. It is now being sold at 53 shillings per cwt. Mr. McAuley thinks the outlook for the Canadian farmer as regards the export of apples and chees is promising.

Local Option in Mariposa.

To The Editor of the Warder. SIR, -Please allow me space in the columns of THE WARDER to lay before the electors of the township of Mariposa, the provisions of the Local Option by-law, upon which they are asked to vote at the Municipal election on Monday next. There are still many who are uninformed, and not a few who have been misinformed as to what this by-law means. All, I think, will be glad to have the fullest each municipality in Ontario the power to prohibit the retail sale of intoxicating liquors within its limits is as follows :- "The council of every township, city, town and is corporated village, may pass by laws for prohibiting the sale of retail or spirituous, fermented, or other

manufactured liquors, in any tavern, inn. or other house or place of public entertainment, in shops and places other than houses of public entertainment: Provided that the by law before the final passing thereof has been duly approved of by the electors of the municipality in the manner provided by the sections in that behalf of the Municipal Act." The law is a part of the present "License Act" of the Province of Ontario. It is not therefore an entirely new law requiring special machinery for its enforcement. It will simply prevent the issue of retail shop and all tavern licenses. The entire machinery of the license law will be available for the prevention of unlicensed liquor selling. Wholesale license can only be taken out according to the provisions of the "Crooks Act." The penalties for unlawingly selling liquor, or keeping it for sale under this by-law are:—For a first offence a fine of from \$50 te \$100, and in default of payment, imprisonment for three months with herd looks for account of hard labor; for a second offence imprisonment with hard labor for four months; and for a third or any subsequent offence, imprisonment with hard labor for six months. Pensities are also provided for purchasing liquor from unlicensed persons, or contrary to law. Power to enter and search every building used as a shop, hotel, or eating house is given to every constable or inspector, and warrants may b issued allowing any officer the right to search any other house or place where he suspects liquor is sold. Any person resisting such search is subject to the same penalties as persons proved to have sold liquor illegally. The lawful keeping of liquor is evidence of illegal dealings therein. Consumption of liquor by any person not an "occupant" of the premises where obtained is evidence of unlawful sale, Provision is made to prevent the lessing of bars in order to evade the law. Inspectors are required to lay informations against law breakers in every case in which information is given by reliable persons. They are required to keep secret the name of their informants. County attorneys are required to prosecute in all such cases, Police officers and constables are also required to take action upon information. Penalties are provided for all cases of failure or neglect on the part of officers to do their duty in seeing the provisions of the law enforced. There is no grounds for dispute as to the disposal of the fines. A certain proportion is made available for law enforcement. The Ontario Government is behind this law. All the members of the legislature, on both sides of the House, supported the Local Option amendment. There can therefore be no dispute as to the duty of provincial and municipal officers to enforce a law enacted in this way. The persons entitled to vote upon the by-law, are the persons who are entitled to vote at municipal elections. Women whose names are on the voters' list are entitled to

vote. Thus far there is no provision made for the repeal of the law. These are the impor-tant points in the Local Option by law. It can readily be seen that it is more satisfactory in its provisions and more workable in its machinery than any law of the kind we have had heretofore. Before closing, I wish to correct a rumor and emphasize one point. It has been said by the opponents of the measure that there is a defect in the framing of the Mariposa by-law. This I wish to deny on the best legal authority. Our by law is sound, It is framed in accordance with the decision given by the Court of Appeal in September last. But it must, of course, be interpreted according to that decision—according to the Statute itself; and according to the amendment of 1891. It has been stated that the machinery of the "License Act" will not be available for the forcement of Local Option. In answer to this I will simply quote the opinion of Hon. A. S. Hardy given in reply to a letter, asking for definite information on this very point; "My opinion is that the License Law where Local Option is that the License Law where Local Option is adopted could remain in force, and that the machinery provided by the License Law applicable to the situation would be available for the purpose of enforcing it. be available for the purpose of enforcing it.

I have no hesitation at all in making known my opinion on Local Option. I am in favor of it—distinctly in favor of it, in all rural municipalities and every other municipality where it can be reasonably well enforced.....

Option clauses to the legislature, in the belief that they would be adopted in many municipalities, and that their adeption would lead to nothing but good."
