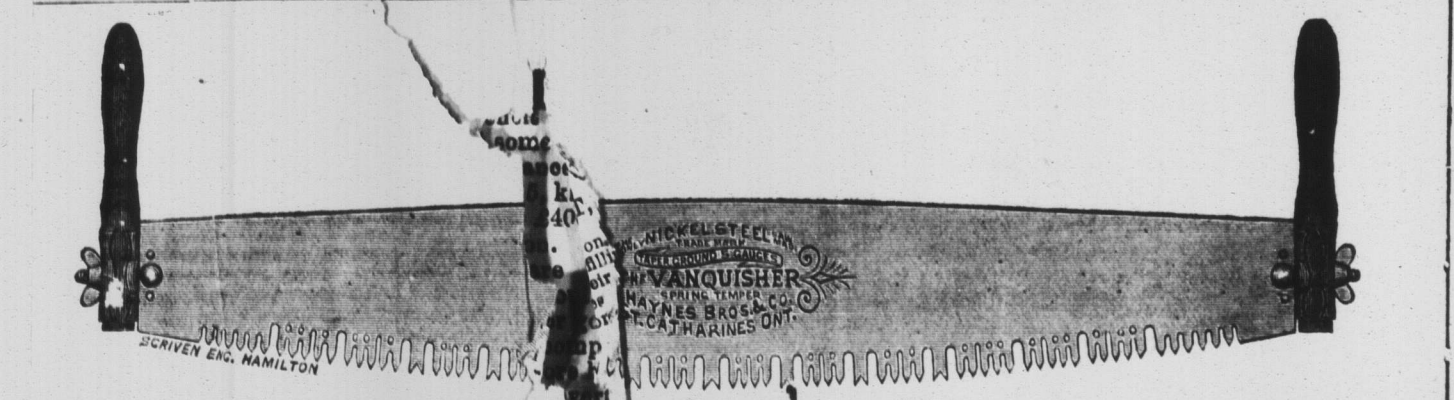

Local Option in Mariposa. To the Editor of the Warmer. Sir,—Please allow me space in the columns of THE WARMER to lay before the electors of the township of Mariposa, the provisions of the Local Option by-law, upon which they are asked to vote at the Municipal election on Monday next. There are still many who are uninformed, and not a few who are misinformed as to what the law means. All, I think, will be glad to have the fullest information on the subject in order to be able to decide the question before them on its merits, and vote intelligently. I will endeavor to be as brief as possible. The law giving each municipality in Ontario the power to prohibit the retail sale of intoxicating liquors within its limits is as follows:—"The council of every township, city, town and incorporated village, may pass by-law for prohibiting the sale of retail or spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors, in any tavern, inn, or other house or place of public entertainment, and for prohibiting altogether the sale thereof in shops and places other than places of public entertainment: Provided that the by-law before the final passing thereof has been duly approved of by the electors of the municipality in the manner provided by the sections in that behalf of the Municipal Act." The law is in part of the present "License Act" of the Province of Ontario. It is not therefore an entirely new law requiring special machinery for its enforcement. It will simply prevent the issue of retail shop and all tavern licenses. The entire machinery of the license law will be available for the prevention of unlicensed liquor selling. Wholesale license can only be taken out according to the provisions of the "Cooks Act." The penalties for unlawfully selling liquor, or keeping it for sale under this by-law are:—For a first offence a fine of from \$50 to \$100, and in default of payment, imprisonment for three months with hard labor; for a second offence imprisonment with hard labor for four months; and for a third or any subsequent offence, imprisonment with hard labor for six months. Penalties are also provided for purchasing liquor from unlicensed persons, or contrary to law. Power to enter and search every building used as a shop, hotel, or eating house is given to every constable or inspector, and warrants may be issued allowing any officer the right to search any other house or place where he suspects liquor is sold. Any person residing such search is subject to the same penalties as persons proved to have sold liquor illegally. The lawful keeping of liquor is evidence of illegal dealings therein. Consumption of liquor by any person not an "occupant" of the premises where obtained is evidence of unlawful sale. Provision is made to prevent the leasing of bars in order to evade the law. Penalties are required to lay information against law breakers in every case in which information is given by reliable persons. They are required to keep secret the name of their informant's. County attorneys are required to prosecute in all such cases. Police officers and constables are also required to take action upon information. Penalties are provided for all cases of failure or neglect on the part of officers to do their duty in seeing the provision of the law enforced. There is no ground for dispute as to the disposal of the fines. A certain proportion is made available for law enforcement. The Ontario Government is behind this law. All the members of the legislature, on both sides of the house, supported the Local Option amendment. There can therefore be no dispute as to the duty of provincial and municipal officers to enforce a law enacted in this way. The persons entitled to vote upon the by-law, and the persons who are entitled to vote at municipal elections, are the same names as on the voters' list are entitled to vote. Thus far there is no provision made for the repeal of the law. These are the important points in the Local Option by-law. It can fairly be said that it is more satisfactory in its provisions and more workable in its machinery than any law of the kind we have had heretofore. Before closing, I wish to correct a rumor and emphasize one point. It has been said by the opponents of the measure that there is a defect in the framing of the Mariposa by-law. This I wish to deny on the best legal authority. Our by-law is sound. It is framed in accordance with the decision given by the Court of Appeal in September last. But it must, of course, be interpreted according to the decision according to the Statute itself; and according to the amendment of 1891. The point that requires emphasis is that in reference to enforcement. It has been stated that the machinery of the "License Act" will not be available for the enforcement of Local Option. In answer to this I will simply quote the opinion of Hon. A. S. Hardy given in reply to a letter, asking for definite information on this very point:—"My opinion is that the machinery of the Local Option is adopted could remain in force, and that the machinery provided by the License Law applicable to the situation would be available for the purpose of enforcing it. I have no hesitation at all in making known my opinion on Local Option. I am in favor of it—distinctly in favor of it, in all rural municipalities and every other municipality where it can be reasonably well enforced. I hope to learn of the success of the by-law." The Government recommended the Local Option clause to the legislature, in the belief that they would be adopted in many municipalities, and that their adoption would lead to nothing but good.
