The English or two rowed barley is preferable to the Canadian six-rowed in many ways, being far superior in sample and yielding qualities, as it is vouched for by scores of farmers in gratifying success this year. These farmers say it requires less seed and returns an averld per acre far in advance of the six-That it is very plump and uniform in the kernel, fanning at for market, with scarcely any tailings. With many who have grown it this year it yielded on an average 60 bushels and upwards per acre, weighing over 50 lbs to the bushel. We find this the opinion of all those with whom we have been conversing concerning their experience with the new barley. It is a question if we can spead thus of our Canadian six rowed which apparently is getting somewhat played out in its jielding and marketable of a lities; besides its liability to be damaged by a shower of rain or a heavy dew depreciating it in value; whereas the English variety is not lessened in value by being colored, yields a better sample and more per acre, and brings a better market price.
