Mr. R. Adam, at the nomination, gave an embellished speech, some of whose features much require criticism as such was not possible at the time.

A good excuse was required by him for refusing to second a motion to withhold the county grant from the Mechanics' Institute, whose library at Lindsay was replenished during the year with \$45 worth of nondescript novels, and all other books \$9. The sanction to those grants, in Mr. Adams' opinion, gives sufficient preponderating influence to repay well in opposing large special grants. Now, Sir,—Mr. Adam not only sanctioned the small grants to charity in town and villages and the three grants to the Mechanics' institutes, making \$425, but forgot to exercise his thus acquired influence in saving the county \$600, special grant to Mr. Fell and \$385

to Mr. Ham, etc.

When this deponent obtained the sanction of the road and bridges committee to a grant of \$125 solely in the interest of Mr. Adams' constituents in Mariposa, he made a motion, through arrent cowardice of combating a motion for \$50 to Eldon, to deprive his own township of the \$125, when read in committee of the whole, which was carried by Mr. Adams casting vote.

This is the qualification you are expected to find in his successor as advised by Mr. Adam.

I think it would be more profitable to the ratepayers to listen to a simple narra-tive of Mr. Adams intromissions of their interests while in his custody, than have the matter presented through the haze of the excessive brightness of the milky way as presented by Mr. Adam.




