Sir,-As I have been informed that a great deal has been said pre and con relative to the markets and prices, in the West, of farm produce the prices are as follows in Sioux City, Iowa:—Wheat, 50 to 60 cts, per bushel; cats. 18 to 28 cts; bari-y, 89c; corn, 21c; rye, 67 to 80 cts; flax, 60 to 75 cts; butter, 8 to 16 cts per lb; eggs per dozen, 8 to 15 cts; beef, \$1.50 to \$4 50 per cw; pork, \$2 25 to \$3 75 per cwt; poultry, \$1 50 to \$2 50 per doze; potatoes per bushel, 15 cts.
