#### Perished in a Hotel Fire.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6. - An appalling catastrophe paralleling in horror and perhaps exseeding in loss of life the Park Place disaster of last summer, occured in the city at an early bour this morning. The Hotel Royal at 6th avenue and 40th street, opposite Bryant Park, was completely destroyed by fire and a large number of people were burned and suffocated in the ruins.

The Hotel Royal was built more than 25 years ago. The house was the home of many persons in the theatrical profession and was patronized chiefly by transients for the night that class which keeps late hours in the upper part of the tenderloin district.

ALL MEANS OF ESCAPE GUT OFF. The fire broke out shortly after three o'clock this morning and spread with fearful rapidity, the flames soon enveloping the entire building and cutting off all means of escape for the

guests rooming in the upper stories of the building.

The origin of the fire is unknown. It started in the basement near the elevator shaft, which was located in the middle of the The fire department arrived within a few minutes after the alarm was given by an en-

while the most heartrending and sickening scenes were being enacted. . The horror-stricken crowd that had quickly gathered in the streets about the doomed building saw men and women clad only in their night clothes, jamp from the upper stories and fall upon the stone flagging of the

gineer on the elevated railroad, but mean-

sidewalks crushed to death or seriously in-Eye witnesses tell of the appearance at the upper windows of terror stricken men and women, who unable to find escape, fell back overcome by the smoke and flames. Every window of the building seemed filled with men, women and childr-n, crying out piteously for those below to save them. Many of those

were certainly burned to death. The fire escapes in the rear of the building afforded a means of escape to some, whilst the fire ropes provided in all the rooms were utilized by many male guests in reaching the According to the most reliable reports there

were about 150 people all told, sleeping in the hotel last night. How many of these were lost may not be ascertained for several days. EVERY ROOM WAS OCCUPIED. Nearly every room of the 124 rooms which the hotel had on its five floors was occupied last night by guests both permanent and tran-

sient, in fact all rooms save four had been

taken at 1 o'clock in the morning when Richard Mears, the proprietor, went to bed. At 3 05 o'clock Mears and his wife, who occupied a room on the third floor 40 feet from the staircase, were aroused and found the staircase in flames. Mear- groped his way to a window through blinding smoke and escaped, and his wife was subsequently rescued

by firemen in an unconscious condition. MANY LEAP TO DEATH. Just as she reached the ground the body of an unknown man, who had jumped from a third story window, struck the pavement and

his brains were dashed out. A moment later another man leaped from a window on the 40th street side and was instantantly killed Shortly afterward two women jumped from windows on the 6thavenue side and were dead when picked up. THE WALLS TUMBLE,

together from Canada.

[Mrs. Cohen, who perished in the fire, was the wife of Mr. J Cohen, who keeps a shoe store at 97 Queen-street west. Two years ago last August she eloped with Louis Levy of London, Out., another victim of the fire. For some time they lived in Chicago, but recenty moved to New York, where they met their doom together in the fatal hotel. The family of Mrs Cohen lives in New York and as soon as her body was recognized her brother sent a message to the deserted husband. Mr. Cohen in response left for New York. Louis Levy is well known in Toronto as an inveterate gambler and poker player. Last spring he attended the Jocky Club meeting and played the races. Shortly afterwards he went to New York.
