He is here in the interest of that country, and represents the Board of Trade and town council of Calgary. Mr. Janes will address public meetings in Victoria as follows: Oakwood on Tuesday evening March 1st, at Little Britain on Wedneeday March 2ud, and at Reaboro on Thursday, March 3rd. In an interview with a Toronto Mail reporter, Mr. Janes said, among other things, which we have not space for this week:—"I have come east for the purpose of laying before the people of the Province of Ontario some important facts regarding the resources of the district of Alberta, and the advantages it affords for all classes of people. The district is on the eastern slope of the Ricky Mountains, known as the Chinook belt, and covers an area of 120,000 square miles. It runs north of the boundary line 450 miles, the width of the southern boundary being 120 miles, at the northern boundary 350. The surface of the land is sloping prairie; about two thirds of the land is halfwooded, half prairie, and there is also good timber along the rivers. Our minerals are almost inexhaustable. We have a vast coal region of 50,000 square miles, and each square mile contaics from fyur to nine millions of tops of coal of all qualities—hard, semi-enthracite, bituminous, and coking coal that will coke 60 per cent. We have fifty millious of acres of land admirably sdapted for mixed farming We can raise wheat, oats, and barley just as you do in Ontarie, except at the foot of the hills Our natural pasturage is doubtless the finest on the continent. At present there are about 200,000 head of cattle and horses grazing on the prairie without receiving either food or shelter except that which the prairie affords them. They are not housed from one year's end to the other."
