

LONDON, March 7.—The Standard's St.
Petersburg correspondent says that a gentleman who was present at the Bradenburg banquet when Emperor William made his memorable speech, remarked to the Emperor:
"Your majesty should not forget Russia." To
this remark Emperor William is said to have
retorted, 'I will pulverize Russia." The
correspondent adds that when Gen. Count
von Schouvaloff, the Russian minister at Berlin, was apprized of this remarkable utterance. lin, was apprised of this remarkable utterance, and upon investigation found that what he had heard was true, he immediately acquainted M. de Giers, the Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs, with the facts in the case, who repeated the remarks of Emperor William to the Czar. The Czar then summoned to his presence Gen. Von Schwernitz, the German ambassador at St. Petersburg, and, after recounting to him the statement made by M. de Giera, said: "Tell your Emperor that when ne wants to begin pulverizing I will throw half a million men across the frontier with the greatest pleasure,"

Poland's Dark Hour.

London, March 7.—A despatch from Warsaw says that of late the Polish revolutionists have been extremely active in propagating their doctrines of Free Poland among all classes of the inhabitants, and the authorities have taken severe measures to suppress the further spread of the idea. One of the steps taken by the military to thwart the success of the propaganda is to billet soldiers at private residences, which it is believed will effectually prevant any discussion of plans to bring about an organized movement against the Czar's

authority. More definite news from Poland in the pas few days points to a step of terrible significance during the next week or two. Gen. Gonrke has returned to Warsaw, His openly expressed intention is to hang a dozen or so principal Polish citizens who are unfriendly to Russian rule. This revival of the awful memories of Mouravieff in 1863, coming in the year when Polish national feeling is running exceptionally high, must produce a profound impression throughout the civilized world. Under other conditions it would probably goad the Poles into attempted insurrection to be put down with wholesale massa-ere. As it is, Poland will not be tricked into any such trap. She is conscious of at last having a friend on the throne in Berlin, and she will bide her time under even the most outrageous provocation, keeping the Nationalist propaganda alive everywhere, but giving the tyrent no overt excuse for slaughter. But even more than Bulgaria, this year Poland will be anxiously watched by those who hold in their bands the destinies of the next war.
